Walkerton--The Picturesque

The Indomitable Old Joe Walker, Who Made It--Events in Its History--Its Industries and Prospects.

One bright day in the month of May, two men stood upon the summit of a hill, looking down upon a valley. Opposite them was a long, straight road, sweeping round to the west to join that upon which they stood, and from a woodland amphitheatre that challenged their gaze, a stream of water, the foot of the hill upon which they stood, ran the River Saugeen with its waters surging about its green-leaves, and they knew the name's significance they could well understand why the aborigine named it The Beautiful. These men, prospecting for a "free" location, were Thomas Adair and Kenneth Kemp, a contemplative Scot. It was late in the afternoon and they were not weary men. They had tramped over the dark ground and pushed thru the dense underbrush all day with heavy packs on their backs containing their blankets, provisions and utensils for cooking. It must have been a lovely scene, that, under such conditions, drew from the unromantic Scotchman the expression: "Eh! mon, if Eden was anything like this, what a fool Adam was to eat the apple!"

The valley beneath them was rich with the bloom of wild cherry and plum trees, and its atmosphere was loaded with the perfume of myriads of flowers. But one of the first white men to look down upon the site of the future town of Walkerton. The woodman's ax had never yet disturbed its silence, the perchance, the canoe of the Indian or of some white trapper and hunter, had gone down the Saugeen. The monarchs have fallen, and not even a stump remains to hint that the valley was once a magnificent forest, yet its glory has not departed, for the town of over 3000 inhabitants that now partly fills the amphitheatre nestles, save its chief business street, among lines of shading maples, a chequer work of foliage. But one of these slaughtered monarchs ever sought revenge. That was at a later day, when the Durham road ran over the hill, and the hill on the west. It was 60 feet long and Walter Nelles was bringing it down upon Nelles in winter. The tongue parted from the sled, he was hurled over the edge of the cliff, and he started down the hill. With his tail it swept Mr. Hill, with his horse and buggy, from the road, and he tumbled them down the incline. Alex. Shaw, Q.C., and Col. Sprout leapt from the road not a moment too soon, and they fled to the hill to escape the sight of the impending destruction, for the primitive hotel of James Morrison stood fair in its path. It went thru the air, and came down like a cannon ball, leaving untouched a woman of 80 and three cats on one side, and a young woman and two children on the other. It is said, never entirely recovered from his injuries. The incident serves to give the reader an idea of the hill wall by which the town is hemmed in, and which, in the midst of the trees, artistic homes of red and white brick, with well-kept lawns bordered among them, the steeped churches and the more pretentious public buildings, including the house of refuge and the hospital, and the rear has but a sketchy likeness of a town whose picturesque blends with its utilitarian features.

In the year of 1849 the two pioneers, William Jasper and Edward Boutton, entered the valley, took up farm lots and together marred its sylvan beauty by making a hole in the woods and constructing the first shanty, east of the river. The same summer two others, in 1851, Thomas Thompson and his wife, settled west of the river. These were all, when, in the same year, came the man of the hour.

It requires many men to build a town, but one man may make it. This sounds like a paradox, but is not. Joe Walker made the town and named it after his home, Walkerton. He was an Irishman, from the County Tyrone, in his prime, who had been a miller and a cooper, and who, in the sylvan site on the river filled all the conditions essential to all these occupations. He settled upon 200 acres of land, and, erecting a house, a barn, and a mill, he was ready to provide for the comfort of his wandering backwoodsman guests, a bed on the floor, a bit of soup, potatoes and deer meat, and a fire to thaw out their toes. But the whiskey, ah! the whiskey, by oxcart express over the hills and stumps and thru the mud from Durham that was a bette noir for an ordinary man, and very nearly so for Joe. He started with three barrels, which he sold at 25 cents a barrel, and he was too frequently for even the strength and patience of Joe, who returned to town at 5.15 p.m., returning to town that night. Four trip service all this week.

RUSSIAN GIRL PLANNED TO BECOME WALKING BOMB

Hoped to Blow Himself Up Along With Staff of the Political Police.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 17.--The police to-day arrested a young girl, nicknamed Wanda, who is accused of participation in a plot to blow up the headquarters of the secret police, situated on the Malaya Canal, whose torture chambers have aroused most bitter feelings on the part of the revolutionists.

The police claim that Wanda planned to become a "walking bomb" and enter the headquarters building in the middle of the day, when it is generally full of police, wearing the uniform of a gendarme officer, lined with wads of gun-cotton and carrying powerful bombs.

Wanda, the police add, hoped by blowing herself up to reduce the entire building to ruins and kill all the officers composing the staff of the political police. The plot was betrayed, and the police, in addition to taking Wanda into custody, arrested a Jewish tailor, in whose shop they seized a half ready uniform, which was intended for the female prisoner.

In consequence of the murderous designs of the revolutionists, the secret police have decided to give up their present headquarters, removing to an isolated stone building on Kameny Island, where an elaborate electric signal system will be installed in order to prevent undermining.

An Old Conductor Laid to Rest.
The funeral of the late James Carter took place yesterday afternoon from 221 Crawford-street, in this city, at Mount Pleasant Cemetery. The funeral was in charge of the Order of Railway Conductors, and the services were conducted by the Rev. C. C. Gilmour, pastor of Queen-street Methodist Church, and Chief Conductor Bro. W. J. C. Carter. The following brethren acted as pall-bearers: Alfred Johns, A. Campbell, R. Norton, W. Hassard, D. White and J. Guthrie. Mr. Carter leaves a widow, three sons and three daughters, to mourn his loss. James and Alfred of the Pullman Company of Chicago, and Joseph of the commercial department of the C.P.R. at Calgary, Alta.; Mrs. Charles Barrett of London, Ont.; Mrs. Bradshaw and Miss Carter of Kaslo, B.C.

The late Mr. Carter was in his 72nd year. He left the Great Western Railway in England for this country forty years ago, and engaged with the Great Western Railway in Canada, and continued in their employ until the amalgamation with the Grand Trunk Railway, and retired from the latter on account of failing health in 1902. Many friends called during the day and paid the last tribute of respect, and quite a number accompanied the remains to the last resting-place.

Suggests Get Together.
NEW YORK, Sept. 17.--The Joint of adherents to-day adopted a resolution recommending that both sides "make every possible effort, for the benefit of the public, to reach a settlement in order that normal telegraphic conditions may be promptly restored."

Cut in Cabin Rate.
LIVERPOOL, Sept. 17.--The American Line has notified its agents here that on and after Jan. 1, 1908, the minimum westward cabin rates will be reduced to \$52.50, which is \$22.50 below the ordinary winter rates.

Is the most delightful time of the year to visit Muskoka. The Grand Trunk Muskoka Express, leaving Toronto at 11.45 a.m., for Muskoka Wharf and Huntsville (Lake of Bays), and the train arriving at Toronto at 3.50 p.m., will continue to run up and including Saturday, Sept. 28. There will not, however, be any connection with these trains between Allandale and Penetang.

Expedition Lost.
BERLIN, Sept. 17.--A telegram from Advent Bay, via Hammerfest, states that nothing has been heard from the William Bruce expedition, which left the base of supply almost one month ago.

As no game can be found along the coast, it is feared that three men of the expedition have perished in an attempt to cross Prince Charles Bay.

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JAP VILLAGE FLOODED.

Fire Starts in Mine and Water Reservoir Breaks.

TOKIO, Sept. 17.--Thirty persons were drowned and 100 houses burned early this morning at the Kosakabi Mine, near Kotaro.

A fire started in the mining works, and while attempts were being made to save the mine the water reservoir was broken, flooding a portion of the village.

Many women and children were among the victims.

Has New Job.
Rev. Elliott S. Rowe, formerly Methodist minister at Victoria, has been appointed secretary of the Vancouver Tourist Association.

Employe Gets Damages.
A county court jury returned a verdict for \$100 damages against Hotchkiss Bros., contractors, in favor of James Brown, who was injured by the collapse of a well at the Canada Foundry in April last.

THE MODUS VIVENDI.
Comment on Premier's Bond's Expression of Disgust.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)
LONDON, Sept. 17.--The Birmingham Daily Post says: "If Bond had not described the modus vivendi as a 'disgrace to British diplomacy' we should not think it worth while to repeat to the subject. It is obviously his purpose to cause as much ill-feeling as he can both locally and imperially."
