Consumption's Ravages. "Of all the causes of deaths given, though the population of the city is in our school books. steadily increasing, the number of deaths annually from this disease has not increased in the same proportion, the mortality remaining about the same doubt, in great measure to better isolaare becoming more and more convinced of its highly contagious character. This number of deaths would be very much reduced, were there any place where these unfortunates could have pure air, and obtain proper treatment and comfortsw hich cannot always be provided in their own homes.

Sanatorium Wanted.

Victoria Hospital will not receive consumptive patients, and rightly so. There should be a sanatorium on the pavilion or cottage plan, which would not cost very much. The Ontario Government has promised \$1 50 per week towards the maintenance of each pa-

Consumptive cases should be reported. Although the Ontario public health act does not require physicians or patients to report cases of consumption to the health office, it would help to reduce the mortality if this were always done. Not that the dwellings would be placarded, but more efficient means of disinfection could be em-

Another disease of the lungs, pneumonia, is credited with 37 deaths. These two diseases it will be seen caused the death of 95 persons, or nearly one-sixth of the whole number.

Deadly Cancer.

To cancer was due the surprising PETTY THEVING. number of 46 deaths, by far the largest number in two decades. Not alone in consumption, but in the other infectious diseases, there has been a very satisfactory decrease. There were 41 cases of typhoid fever, with 14 deaths; Discussed by the Children's Aid diphtheria, 156 cases, with 12 deaths; scarlet fever, 49 cases, with only one death. Of these 146 cases of diphtheria and 41 of scarlet fever were attended

in Victoria Hospital. Eleven deaths were due to premature birth during the year. Of the 972 births, there were 47 still born, the largest number in many years.


