FAST RECORDS MADE THIS YEAR. New York Sun: Unless the unexpected happens, few more fast records will be made, although Star Pointer is still waiting at Terre Haute for a favorable opportunity to beat all harness records. There is a general feeling of disappointment among horsemen over the failure of the champion pacer to set the record of 1:58 or thereabouts, but the doings of the year on the whole have more than fulfilled expectations.

More high class trotters have come to the front this year than ever before. Bingen's mile in 2:06% in the 2:11 race at Louisville goes into the records as the fastest performance by a trotter since 1895, and it equals the best time on record for 5-year-olds, Ralph Wilkes' 2:0634 having stood alone since 1894. Directum, 2:051/4, is the only stallion that has beaten Bingen's mark. No less than five 4-year-old trotters have beaten 2:10 this season, the quintet including John Nolan, 2:08; Directum Kelly, 2:08¼; Nico, 2:08¼; Cresceus, 2:0¾, and Battleton,2:09¾. Although the fastest one of the lot is nearly three seconds away from Directum's champion record at this age, Kelly, Nico and Nolan are looked upon as being among the fastest and best trotters ever seen

Although he met with four defeats between June and October, Nolan's campaign was no less remarkable, for he placed to his credit the largest amount won by any trotter this year, and wound up the campaign by beating the best horses in training in the fastest five-heat race on record. Another distinction which belongs to Nolan is the fastest record ever made by any trot-

ter during his first year on the turf. The California gelding, Who-Is-It, still heads the list of 3-year-old trotters with his record of 2:12, but his honors will hardly be secure until the classic Kentucky state race is decided at Lexington today. In this race the Futurity winner, Peter the Great, 2:12½, will meet Cuprum, 2:12¾; John A. McKerron, 2:121/2; Dr. Spellman, 2:131/4; Charley Herr, 2:131/4, and Nowaday, 2:161/4, and it will not be surprising if one or another of the crack youngsters trots a mile in 2:12 or bet-The 2-year-old trotters of the year look like a commonplace lot when their performances are compared with the champion record for young-sters of this age. Mary Celeste, the black filly by Oro Wilkes, 2:11, that won the Matron stakes at Louisville, stands at the head of the list, but there is a vast difference between her mile in 2:17½ and the wonderful re-ord of 2:10¾, made by Arion to a high-wheel sulky in 1891. The scarcity of high-class 2-year-olds is of course attributed to the fact that very few trotters are nowadays started in pub-lic at this age. It is the universal opinion among horsemen, however, that if every trotting colt in the country were trained as a 2-year-old the best part of a lifetime might elapse before another such as Arion was discovered. Mary Celeste, the holder of the record for 1898, was sold in this city last year for \$410. R. C. Stinson, of Brant-

ford Ont., being the buyer. On the

day that she trotted in 2:17½ at Louisville, her dam was sold at one of the horse exchange sales for \$130, and a full sister of Mary Celeste, one year old, was struck off for \$40.

The performances of the pacers have been unusually brilliant this year. Among the 5-year-olds Anaconda holds the first honors, with a mark of 2:04%.

ong the 5-year-olds Anaconda holds the first honors, with a mark of 2:04%, which is only a second slower than John R. Gentry's champion record for pacers of this age. Searchlight's 2:04½ is high-water mark for 4-year-olds, and is probably the fastest mile ever actually paced by a colt of his age, although Online's 2:04, made at Sioux City in 1894, is technically the cham-City in 1894, is technically the champion 4-year-old record. Klatawah's 2:05½ beats all previous preformances for 3-year-olds, supplanting Directly's mark of 2:07½. Directly still holds the 2-year-old championship, however, his mark of 2:07% at that age having stood since 1894. Ecstasy's mile in 2:10½ at Lexington last Saturday is the best 2-year-old record for 1898, and the best

ever made in a race. The number of trotters that have entered the 2:10 list this year has reached nineteen. At Los Angeles, Cal., a few days ago, Toggles joined the select list by winning a heat from Monterey in 2:10. The newcomer is a brown gelding, 7 years old, by Strathway, 2:19, a son of Steinway, 2:25%, and Countess (dam of Dawn, 2:18%), by Whipple's Hambletonian. Toggles came out as a 4-yearold, gaining a record of 2:17% in his first race, and cutting it down to 2:16 two days later. He started only twice in 1895. In 1896 he trotted seven races against such horses as Ottinger, 2:0914, Stam B, 2:11, Jasper Ayres, 2:09, and Altao, 2:09%, and lowered his record to 2:12½. He did not start last year.
