London, Oct. 9.-The weird suggestion is made by Robert Ross, that another person was buried with Sir Henry Irving in Westminster Abbey. Ross writes:

"A young actor of my acquaintance who bore the honored name of Siddons was invited to take part in the Irving funeral services. His stepfather was connected by marriage with the great actress, Mrs. Siddons, and he was very proud of his physical resemblance to her, as shown in her portrait by Reynolds.

"Since the burial of Irving he has never been seen, though I saw him in the funeral cortege. All his friends remember a curious exaltation in his manner for a few days before the ceremony, and I cannot help thinking that, in a moment of enthusiasm, realizing that that would be his only chance of burial in the abbey, he took advantage of the bowed and observant heads during the prayer of committal and crept beneath the pall into the great actor's tomb. I have been assured that mysterious sounds were heard for several days after the burial."
