

All Soldiers Who Went Overseas and All Who Served Year in Canada Now Entitled to Some Gratuity Pay

Change in Regulations Brings Joy To Many and Will Mean Expenditure of Millions—Removes Complaints of G. W. V. A. and Individuals.

Information has been received at military headquarters here to the effect that an order-in-council has been passed, authorizing war service gratuity for soldiers who have been overseas, but have not seen service in an actual theatre of the war; also to soldiers who have had more than one year's service in Canada, and who were discharged prior to November 11, 1918. All payments will be made from Ottawa, and a new form of affidavit in lieu of preparation, will be available, during the first week in July.

Sweeping Changes. This order-in-council makes a sweeping change in war service gratuity regulations, involving the payment of millions of dollars, as prior to this order, soldiers of the Canadian army who served in England only, and were not in khaki on November 11 last, were not eligible for war service gratuity, neither were soldiers who served in Canada and were discharged prior to November 11, 1918. The previous regulations regarding this point were regarded as unjust at military headquarters here expressed their pleasure when informed of the new regulations. Many former soldiers in this district benefit by the change, and they are jubilant because of the fact that it is expected that payments from Ottawa will follow soon after the receipt of the affidavits in lieu of preparation by claimants for gratuity, and these affidavits will be available next week.

All Are Pleased.

While this order-in-council calls for a host of additional work for the paymasters' department at Ottawa, the change is welcomed, as it accords justice to all soldiers involved, and officers at military headquarters here expressed their pleasure when informed of the new regulations. Many former soldiers in this district benefit by the change, and they are jubilant because of the fact that it is expected that payments from Ottawa will follow soon after the receipt of the affidavits in lieu of preparation by claimants for gratuity, and these affidavits will be available next week.

"He slapped my face," said the little girl, pointing to Leff, who is seventeen and tall for his age.

"Nothing," she testified briefly in a most business-like manner.

"Didn't you call Leff a dirty Jew and lots of other names?" she was asked.

"Never a word," then her brother took her place and said that he heard Leff slap his sister, but did not hear any name-calling.

"I called him a Jew, and he called me a Catholic, then he went around the corner," he explained.

ITALIAN PREMIER ASKS FOR SUPPORT OF ALL PARTIES.—Rome, Wednesday, June 25.—Premier Tittoni, addressing the Senate today, called upon Parliament and the country for their full and unqualified support for their full and unqualified support, regardless of party. He said the Italian Parliament and the country realize with anxiety that while the disposition of the national aspirations still are uncertain, those of other powers already have been acknowledged. He said he was quite willing to answer all legitimate requests for explanations.

High Cost of Living.—The high cost of living was dealt with in a resolution introduced by Mrs. Kelly, which condemned the Ontario Legislature for its failure to deal with the matter, and its abandonment of the investigation and prosecution of alleged combines formed to limit competition and to enhance prices.

Middlesex Member's Resolution.—C. Elliott introduced a resolution favoring provincial grants towards construction and maintenance of township roads, and further, that the provincial highway construction should not be gone on with until the route, quality and standard of the work are submitted to and passed by the Legislature.

Mr. Hartley Dewart introduced a resolution on parage, urging creation of a non-partisan civil service board and the purchase of all supplies for the public service should be made on a business basis and by tender in open competition.

Mr. Froude introduced a resolution favoring the placing of a law upon the statute book providing that the election of members to the Legislature and municipal councils by a form of proportional representation.

Labor Questions.—On the premise that labor questions are of paramount importance in these times of industrial unrest and world upheaval, particularly matters relating to the maximum hours of the labor day, insurrection, sickness and unemployment, old age pensions and the harmonizing of the interests of employer and employed, the committee passed a resolution that the Government create a provincial industrial council, consisting of an equal number of employees and employers, men and women, together with a chairman appointed by the Government, to consider and report on the causes of the present unrest, and the steps necessary to safeguard and promote the best interests of employers and state.

CONVENTION ADOPTS WOMEN'S RESOLUTION TO ABOLISH SENATE.—[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, June 25.—Amid a scene of wild enthusiasm today the Ontario Liberal convention adopted a resolution passed by the women of the province for the abolition of the Senate because of its attitude towards prohibition legislation. The resolution was as follows:

"That the Liberals of Ontario, in convention assembled, hereby affirm their conviction that the British North American act should be amended so as to provide for the abolition of the Senate."

The resolution was not entirely unanimous, but another resolution condemning the action of the Senate in regard to the temperance act legislation was unanimously agreed to.

No member, however, had any defence of the Senate to offer, and opposition to its abolition was confined to a motion to strike out the clause, which was seconded without discussion, and lost on the division.

RESOLUTION DEFEATED.—Saskatoon, Sask., June 25.—At the convention of grain growers of Saskatchewan district held here yesterday a resolution asking that the convention pledge itself to the nomination of only a bona fide farmer candidate as federal representative was defeated.

A resolution was passed disapproving of the attitude of J. R. Wilson, the member at Ottawa, toward tariff reform.
