milk, pour gradually into flour

mixture, stir into batter, pour

bake in hot oven for thirty minutes.

Put into a basin three-quarters pound

suet, one tablespoonful sugar, one

teaspoonful baking soda, half a pound

marmalade, and mix, then add

four cups of flour, mix well, cover

with buttered paper and steam

for two hours. Serve with sweet

sauce.
