man to man. "Specialization is civilization. It has intertwined the human race. Single taxers insist that there must be no interference with that interchange the wide world over. The value given to certain properties by the concentration of industry should the concentration of industry should go into the common purse. This is the ark of our covenant as an economic proposition." At the same time he recognized the necessity of palliatives in the present abnormal conditions.


