A NEW METHOD OF DETERMINING MENTAL DISORDERS. Studies of mental disorder are bringing astonishing insight into the workings of the human mind. Dr. E. W. Scribner states that mental facts are revealed by three methods—(1) that of simple observation, in the usual medical treatment; (2) that of experimental psychology, analyzing a patient's mental condition by tests and records, and (3) that of "psych-analysis," a novel kind of investigation in which a person is made to betray his thoughts, past deeds and projects by answers or acts that unconsciously indicate what is most in mind.
