

white bunting, with a thread of the same colors running from end to end, while beneath hung a drape of khaki, setting off the building most effectively. On the bunting were placed many metallic shields, surmounted by the corresponding plaid. These included the emblems of Bruce Wallace, the Duke of Rothesay (Prince of Wales), the Royal Stuart and the Dress Stuart.

The regiments represented were 42nd and 73rd Royal Highlanders, 79th Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, 91st and 93rd Princess Louise's Highlanders, 48th Highlanders, 75th and 92nd Gordon Highlanders, 72nd and 78th Seaforth Highlanders, all of which have recently served in the South African war. The roof of the building was covered by the St. Andrew's Cross, and festoons of red, white and blue bunting radiating to the four corners. On the ground floor and in the balcony were cosy corners tastily draped off with Oriental rugs. The dressing rooms and the conservatory were likewise a mass of color.
