C. P. R.'s Plan For Catering at Its Great Railway Shops in Calgary

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company does nothing by halves. In connection with its great railway shops at Calgary it has just entered into a contract with a caterer to provide dinner for 2,000 men each day, and get through with it all in an hour. The company has provided a dining hall 300 feet long and fifty feet wide, and the caterer has undertaken to provide such a service that there will be no delay. It is further provided that the foreman of the different departments will constitute a committee to deal with any complaints of service that may be made. Not the least interesting fact in connection with the service is that the cost of a first-class meal will, it is said, be less than twenty-five cents.
