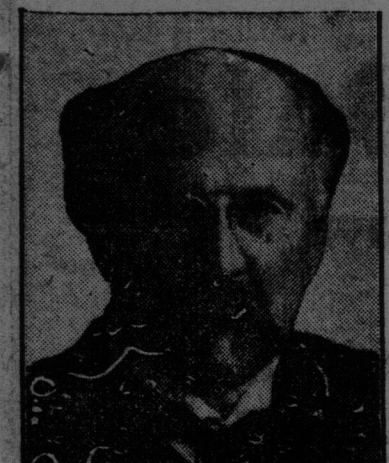
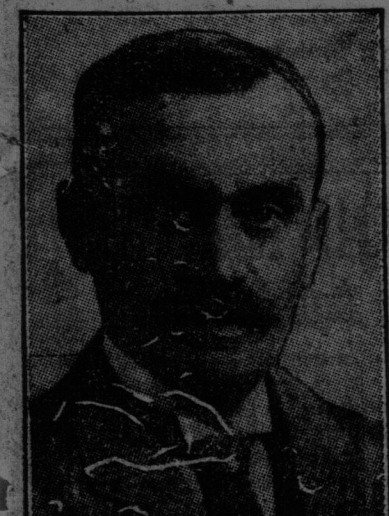

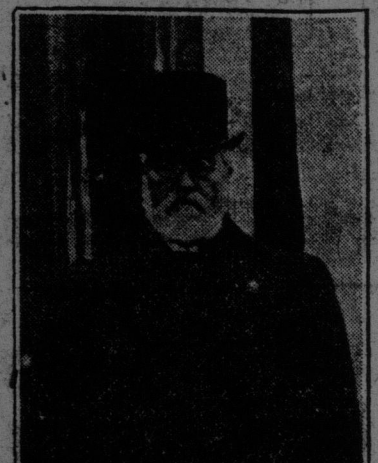

HOME RULE FOR IRELAND

Speeches by Sir Edward Carson, John E. Redmond and Sir Rufus Isaacs and a Manifesto by Orange Grand Lodge

Dublin, Dec. 28.—Sir Edward Carson, speaking at Croagh, caused some amusement in his opening remarks by announcing that he had received a post card addressed "The Right Hon. E. Carson, Blather House, London." It had been delivered duly at the House of Commons.

Turning to the insurance bill, he asked what they were coming to. The government were still discussing, taking away all power from the second chamber and depriving the people of the right of appeal to the courts.
