\$3,000,000 TO EDUCATION BOARD

John D. Rockefeller Out of
Standard Oil Company of
New Jersey.

Washington, Dec. 19.—John D. Rockefeller does not own one share of the stock of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, the parent of the great oil corporation cut up into segments by the court decision of a decade ago.

This revelation was made by Walter C. Teagle, president of the company, appearing before the Senate sub-committee investigating the prices and conditions in the oil industry of this country.

Only six stock-holders have more than one per cent. of the company's stock, Mr. Teagle said. The largest of these is John D. Rockefeller, Jr. His total is 11.4 per cent.

Three of the remaining five common stock-holders on this list, said Mr. Teagle, "owning together ten per cent. of the common stock, are philanthropic institutions, such as the Rockefeller Foundation and the General Education Fund."

Then he brought out his spouse, "about Mr. Rockefeller quite casually."

"It might be of interest to the community," he said, "to know that John D. Rockefeller Sr. has not been a shareholder in the company since 1920, and that the late William Rockefeller owned only 700 shares at the time of his death."

The principal recipient of the Standard Oil of New Jersey stock is said to have been the General Education Board to which Mr. Rockefeller has given a total of \$83,000,000. Disposal of the bulk of his remaining holdings have been made by transfer to members of his family, and John D. Rockefeller, Jr., is thought to have received most of the shares that were alienated from the elder oil magnate's estate in this fashion. Philanthropies are said to have received any shares that remained over and above the gifts to the Education Board and the Rockefeller family.

Confirmation of this surmise is seen in Mr. Teagle's statement that John D. Rockefeller, Jr., is now the largest single owner of the common stock, with 11.4 per cent., and three institutions hold 10 per cent., the Rockefeller Foundation which is the general distributing agency for Mr. Rockefeller's philanthropies being one of them, with a 4 per cent. interest in the New Jersey company.

Doubt exists, however, as to whether Mr. Rockefeller has disposed of his preferred stock in the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey. In some quarters it is believed that Mr. Teagle referred only to common stock when he declared that Mr. Rockefeller was no longer a stockholder in the New Jersey corporation, and that he still holds a bloc of the senior security.

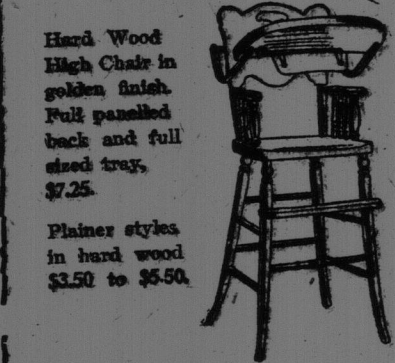

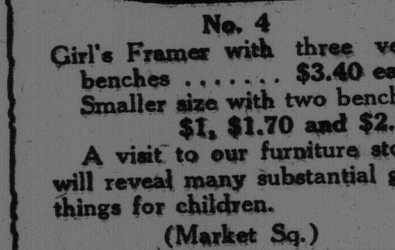

London, Dec. 5.—(By mail).—Married in a wrong name—her veil torn off accidentally at the church gates—and a knife broken while cutting her wedding cake.

This was the strange series of misfortunes which befell Miss Florence Nation at her marriage to Edward Brooks at St. James' Church, Brixton. The trouble arose through the fact that two marriages had been arranged—one at two o'clock and the other at 2.15.

The 2.15 bridegroom arrived at the church first, and formal particulars were taken in the vestry. Miss Nation's husband-to-be arrived just before two o'clock, and the vicar, with

the wrong papers in his hand, at once proceeded with the service.

Both Miss Nation and Mr. Brooks repeated after the vicar the wrong Christian names (those of the second couple), thinking that he had made a slight mistake.

This the vicar noticed only when the couple signed their real names in the vestry register.

The vicar blamed the verges, and the verges blamed the bridegroom for not coming earlier.

Miss Nation and Mr. Brooks were then remarried "in brief"—the vicar did not remove the wedding ring, but held the couple's clasped hands.
