Daily Fish Bulletin

Issued by Canada Food Board.

STEAM TRAWLING.



Trawling is perhaps the simplest method of catching fish. There are no hooks, lines or bait to bother with, and the whole operation consists of dragging a huge poke-shaped net over the sea bottom. This net is made of strong hemp or manilla twine, with a mouth ninety to one hundred feet wide. It is kept open by means of two doors or "otter boards" at each side of the mouth. To these otter boards are attached the steel wire towing warps. The warps are coiled around the drums of the great trawl winch on the fore deck of the vessel and lead to two galleys placed forward and aft on the deck of the ship. When the winch winds the net in, the otter boards come up to the galleys and the net lies alongside the ship and can be hauled aboard by tackles. The fish slide into the apex, or "cod end" of the net. A stop is placed just above the cod end and clapping on a stout tackle from the foremast, the draw rope is made up again, and the net is hove into the water, ready for another haul.

Food Board Flash

Every precaution should be taken to see that no windfall apples go to waste this year. Gather every one and dry those that are not used in any other way. Prepare the apples for drying by peeling, coring and slicing them one-quarter of an inch thick. Then drop them in brine made with one tablespoon salt to two quarts of water. This keeps them white. Spread them on clean towels to absorb excess moisture. Then put them on trays and dry them either in the sun or by artificial heat. Finally store them in the cellar or in the beginning of the war.
