Ottawa, Oct, 11—An alternate plan of assisting veterans according to length and character of service was submitted to the special committee on soldier civil reestablishment yesterday afternoon by Col J. W. Margeson of the board of pensions commissioners. His plan was presented as coming from himself. It is to give every man who served in a theatre of war as a combatant seventy cents a day from enlistment to discharge. Men serving in England or Siberia would receive this to include gratuity.

He would limit the amount of cash to \$500 and place the rest of a man's credit with the government, so that he could draw on it for any of the government restablishment plans. Widows of soldiers would be paid a stated sum, all alike regardless of their husband's service, this sum to be paid as additional to their pensions.


