"In agriculture," said the governor, "there is nothing of which the state has a comparative advantage than the stimulation of agriculture." The Main Building.

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In the women's section above is the Red Cross booth with its many flags. Miss M. E. McGee is in charge and her assistants are Miss Frances Stetson, Miss Mabel Thomson and the members of the various committees. Miss Ethel H. Jarvis, the provincial secretary, is at the booth in the mornings and evenings and new members are enrolled.

The Women's Hospital Aid has a small stand at which the hospital cook books are for sale. In charge of the Aid is Mrs. Stackhouse who is in charge, assisted by Mrs. Sims.

The St. John Ambulance Association has a well arranged booth in which the Vice President, Mr. R. M. Riddan and Miss Marion L. C. Magee, give demonstrations in first aid and home nursing and where any accident cases will be attended to. The booth is fitted with a first aid kit and necessary equipment. Mrs. J. Boyle Travers is in charge.

Workmen's Compensation.

The Workmen's Compensation Board has a booth connecting with the St. John Ambulance Association booth and at it registers those desirous of entering for free instruction in first aid which is given by the two organizations in co-operation. Child Welfare Concourse.
The Child Welfare Concourse, arranged under the auspices of the department of health and the minister of health, Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, is somewhat similar to that arranged last year. Dr. Doris Murray is in charge and each of the seventeen booths in the concourse is in charge of a separate organization with a separate convener. In each booth demonstrations or addresses are given or clinics held, each explanatory of matters

The different booths and those in charge are as follows: Better baby clinic, V. O. nurses in charge, Miss Coates, superintendent, convener; prenatal care, public health nurses in charge; diets for one month to twelve months old, public health nurses in charge; diets for one year to two years of age, Royal Standard Chapter, I. O. E., Mrs. J. Pope Barnes, convener; preschool age diets, Catholic Women's League, Mrs. R. O'Brien convener; nu-

tritional booth, food for six to sixteen years of age, Loyalist Chapter, I. O. D. E., Miss Catherine McAvity, convener; anti-tuberculosis booth, Mr. Davis in charge; Little Mothers' League, where children are taught the care of babies, V. O. nurses in charge; oral prophylaxis clinic booth, Doctors F. C. Bonnell, O. Nase, L. DeV. Chipman and H. D. Fritz; housing, sanitation and anti-fly booth, in charge of the King's Daughters, with Mrs. C. A. Clark, convener; social hy-

giene booth, Dr. J. A. McCarthy, supervisor playgrounds booth, Miss Heffer, convener; kindergartens booth, Mrs. F. E. Holman, convener; mental hygiene booth, C. E. Reicker, convener; care of the blind booth, the Y. W. H. A. in charge, Mrs. L. Isaacs, convener. Silent teachers and a question box occupy two of the remaining booths and in the last booth is the special section added this year.
