- Q. 118 Did you see him this month?
- A. 118 I cannot say definitely.
- Q. 119 Can you tell me how long the accused has been up there?
- A. 119 He's been there quite a while; some time around Christmas time, I think.
- Q. 120 Since Christmas time of what year?
- A. 120 Christmas of last year.
- Q. 121 Have you seen him there since?
- A. 121 Yes, I think so.
- Q. 122 How many Veteran Guards are there?
- A. 122 There are four guards.
- Q. 123 Who was in charge of them?
- A. 123 Corporal Lee.
- Q. 124 What evidence have you to offer to the Court in connection with the charges against the accused in relation to what occurred at Thurso, Quebec? Will you state the date if you can remember it?
- A. 124 The date was Wednesday, March 15, 1944.
- Q. 125 Where were you on the morning of that day?
- A. 125 I was at Duhamel at our "woods headquarters".
- Q. 126 Which is how many miles from Thurso?
- A. 126 57 miles.
- Q. 127 Did you see the accused on that morning?
- A. 127 Yes, Sir.
- Q. 128 Where?
- A. 128 At Duhamel.
- Q. 129 Will you tell the Court under what circumstances you saw him and what he was doing?
- A. 129 He went to the office, and I remember distinctly giving him a copy of the movement order. We were expecting fourteen new prisoners from Maniwaki. I gave him this movement order and we discussed arrangements about the men who had to go to the dentist.
- Q. 130 You refer to 14 prisoners from Maniwaki; where were they going?
- A. 130 They were coming to join our project.
