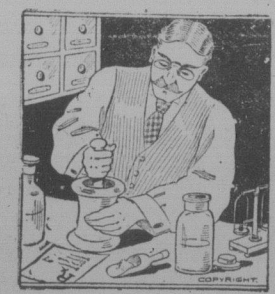

Money for Mexico.

Montreal, Aug. 3.—It is said that the visit of Eugene C. Croel, Mexican ambassador to the United States, who has been in Ottawa for some time, will be followed by some developments in connection with the relations of the Dominion and the great republic is of great financial significance.

A large amount of Canadian capital has been invested in Mexican enterprises, both electric and mining, and Mr. Croel, who has during the principal part of his life been closely associated with Mexican banks and railways, desires to effect an alliance between the banks of which he is the controlling spirit in Mexico, and the principal banking institutions of Canada. The object of this alliance is a free inflow of capital from Canada to Mexico.

Mr. Croel had conferences with the heads of the Bank of Montreal, the Bank of Commerce and other financial institutions.

Pure Food Congress.

Paris, Aug. 3.—When Harvey W. Wiley, chief of the bureau of chemistry in the United States Agricultural Department, returns to Washington he will recommend that the American Government call an international pure food congress to establish international food standards. He says the French Government is favorable to this scheme.

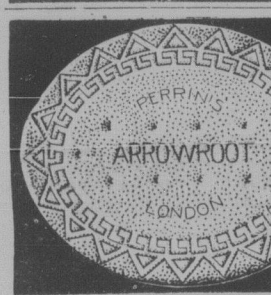
