FIRST EDITION. THE SUN LABEL SUIT.

PROCEEDINGS IN COURT YESTERDAY AFTERNOON AND THIS MORNING.

The Plaintiff's Case is Closed—Mr. Curry opens the Case for the Defence and outlines the Evidence to be Produced. Fredericton, Nov. 4.—Thomas Fowler of Fredericton was the first witness in the afternoon and testified that he got from the post office on 20th February the Sun addressed to his father and gave it to the plaintiff who boards with them; that he put his name on the paper at the judge's request and never afterwards saw the paper till the present time; that he read the material part of the article when pointed out to him by the plaintiff.

James H. Hawthorne testified to receiving the Sun papers and their contents and that he was only agent for the Sun in the way of ordinary business. James Steadman testified that he was the plaintiff in the suit; that he was judge of the county court for Queen's and Sunbury; that he reviewed the Queen county list under the franchise act; that he had an office at Gagetown, which in his absence, was in charge of his clerk, T. Babbitt, who is also registrar of deeds and secretary treasurer of Queen county. The witness identified the copies of the Sun which he had bought in Fredericton; said he had read the articles complained of, and that his attention was called to them by a number of persons.

On cross-examination witness said that prior to these papers being shown in court he said he had never refused Mr. Curry permission to see the papers; and had told Curry he was the author of the article in question and gave that as a reason for refusal; and that he gave defendant's attorney permission to examine the papers and make extracts therefrom, and had so instructed Mr. Babbitt, in 1889, the law directed him to have a clerk, since which time he had retained Mr. Babbitt, and had not heard of any objection to Babbitt. In 1888, was quite sure he had heard none from Curry; there had been some talk of finding a man who had received a letter from Ottawa in the same connection.

Mr. Skinner sought to put in a copy of a letter to Judge Steadman from Ottawa, the copy being in Babbitt's writing. Mr. Curry objected to the introduction of the original had been lost, which objection the court sustained. In re-examination witness gave particulars of the time he spent in the county, etc. Some hundreds of applications for enrollment as voters were identified by witness as having been taken up in accepting a fee.

Considerable discussion took place as to the admissibility of evidence relating to the application of Fred Alward's name to the enrollment on the voter list. Mr. Curry contended that the evidence could not prove the case on cross-examination. Chief Justice Allen, thought that the rule as to this point was very stringent, otherwise he could see no objection to Mr. Skinner's question and would allow it. Mr. Skinner declined to press it. A like question arose on conversation between Messrs. Curry, Pater and Pater.

Just prior to adjournment, Mr. Skinner having asked witness if he had received applications in Fredericton within legal limits for depositing them, he stated that yesterday afternoon if he had had them in time to forward them to Gagetown before the expiration of the period, but in relation to the papers in question they were received in Fredericton a day late, having been mailed to him at Fredericton from St. John on the last day of the limit.

In reply to Mr. Skinner, witness stated that in 1888 he had instructed Mr. Babbitt to return to applicants any defective applications to remedy the defects, but had not extended to the relation of 1888, on being pressed by Mr. Skinner for his reason, witness said he had done so because the conservators had allowed him. The court adjourned till 10 o'clock Wednesday morning.

SECOND EDITION. U. S. ELECTIONS.

THE DEMOCRATS HAVE MADE SUBSTANTIAL GAINS IN DIFFERENT STATES.

A Probable Democratic Governor for Massachusetts—The election of Mayor of New York—A Light Negro Vice. (SPECIAL TO THE GAZETTE.) PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 5.—The returns from different sections of this state show a large Democratic gain. The Republicans ticket is probably elected by a reduced majority. The Democrats have thrown out a portrait of Patterson, claiming his election as governor by 10,000 majority.

ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 5.—From special returns all over the state the Evening Journal estimates that Republicans have 71 members in the next assembly. The Argus claims the assembly will stand on Democratic lines. The Democrats are giving the Democrats a majority on a joint ballot and electing a Democratic United States senator from New York.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Returns in complete at midnight indicate that Mayor Grant is re-elected by from 15,000 to 20,000 majority. COLUMBIA, N. C., Nov. 5.—Indications so far heard from are that Tillman (Democrat) for Governor and the entire Democratic ticket is elected and that the Democratic congressmen have carried throughout the state.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Private dispatches received here late tonight from Washington, W. Va., indicate the election of a Democratic ticket. RALEIGH, N. C., Nov. 5.—The election of a Democratic ticket. The vote fell off in the eastern portion, being largely due to the exodus and the equally voters. The Democrats are reported to have gained 500 in Johnson county, but returns are coming in very slowly. Returns from four counties in the precincts in the state show a Democratic gain over 1887 of 445.

NEARLY HALF A MILLION OF BUSHELS INSPECTED AT WINNIPEG.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 5.—Nearly half a million bushels of wheat have been inspected at Winnipeg since the beginning of the present grain season and probably half a million more will be inspected through to Post Arthur for grading. The grain movement is only now beginning to pick up again after the rainy weather and the amount to send out will largely increase.
