WAGE EARNERS SEEK ESTABLISHMENT OF BANKS TO PREVENT MANIPULATION

International Association of Machinists Has Bank of its Own Which Has Already Proved Useful to That Organization During An Industrial Dispute-Vote on Co-operatives.

"Organized labor in Canada is clared a lock-out. Two firms re-seeking to establish banks with the object of preventing manipulation of the private banks to the detri-ment of labor," said James Somer-as the latter needed credite in organizer of machinists, in an interview last week at Winnipeg. He had just come from Rochester,

where he attended the convention of the International Association of Machinists.

Commenting on the proceedings at the Rochester convention, Mr. Somerville wald the association had taken a forward step in the matter of handling finance. It had established a bank of its own in Washinston, D. C., and a strong desire was shown for the extension of the bank movement, so that in addition to labor looking after the savings of workers it would be in a financial rosition to protect them from a line of attack which, he said, was often adopted.
