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WORK BELOW WITH WATER TO WAISTS

ENGINEERS SAVED LIVES

One Passenger Drowned and Another Succumbs to Shock—Tricky Waters to Blame

The question of the civic pipe yard, which it was proposed to locate at the corner of Queen's avenue and Chambers street, and over which there has been so much discussion and petitioning, is still in a condition to receive buffets at the hands of adverse critics, since the conclusive defeat of the by-law to authorize the purchase of the site for the purpose of looking over all the likely sites in the city.

Mayor Morley announced his intention of reopening the whole matter at last Friday's night's meeting of the council, and will post a notice on the bulletin board to give its reintroduction effect. It does not follow, however, that another site will be selected for the pipe yard in view of the opposition to the present scheme; it simply means that the whole council will form itself into a committee of inspection for the purpose of looking over all the likely sites in the city.

Arising from the report of the city assessor and returning officer, who submitted the results of the by-law voting, the question was immediately taken up by Alderman Moreby, who suggested that the defeat of the by-law to authorize the sale of the Spring Ridge properties amounted to a moral defeat of the city council, and that it was the duty of the council to take steps to rectify the situation.
