LOCAL NEWS

The police put out a bon-fire on Mockenberg street last night.

Stanley Martin found a bicycle in Gilbert's Lane yesterday and handed it over to the North End police.

Between seven and eight o'clock this morning a delivery team of McAlary and Co. ran away on Douglas Avenue. There was no one in the wagon at the time, and before the animal could be stopped considerable damage had been done to the wagon.

Accommodation was heavily taxed on the outward trip of the Calvin Austin to Boston last evening. The state-rooms for Saturday night's trip are rapidly being booked and over five hundred city persons will leave on the boat.

The application for tickets for the Pulpit banquet continue to come in in fairly large numbers. So far Mr. Keith has not received replies from any of the invited guests other than those which have already been announced.

It is reported that Thomas Ferguson, Chief Engineer on the Government steamer Earl Grey, is to be appointed inspector of machinery in the Marine and Fisheries Department. Mr. Ferguson, who belongs to Pictou, was formerly of the steamer Stanley and went to England to bring out the Lady Grey.—Echo.

The funeral of the late Elias W. Elliott took place at 2:30 this afternoon from his residence, 30 Wellington Row. The funeral service was conducted at the house by Rev. A. B. Cohen and at its conclusion a short service was held by the Prebsters of which order Mr. Elliott had been a member for many years. The interment was made in Fernhill cemetery.

Fire destroyed the blacksmith shop at Brown's Plaza, owned by W. L. Day, at an early hour this morning. The destruction of the shop and the tools and lumber which it contained will entail a loss of \$500 and there is no insurance. Mr. Day was awakened by the glare of the flames and securing help from the residents of Beulah Camp managed to extinguish the fire. The house was saved with difficulty.

Game warden Dean has had a conference with the market dealers and a number of them have applied for licences to sell carcasses of big game. The license costs one dollar and is obtained from the Surveyor General's office at Fredericton. Warden Dean also called the attention of the dealers to the provision requiring them to preserve the shipping tags, giving the name of the hunter, number of license, etc.

Although there is nothing definite from the agents at this port, yet there is a possibility that more grain will be shipped from Halifax this coming season than there has been for some years and one line of steamers, at least, is expected to carry a great deal more grain this season than they have been doing of late years. The Furness-Withby Co. is reported to have contracted 125,000 bushels of grain to Liverpool and London. The 125,000 bushels will be shipped from Halifax and will pass through the L. C. R. elevator.—Echo.

HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL

TEAM GETTING IN SHAPE

To Play a Series of Games With Rothesay—Some Strong Men on the Lineup.

The local High School foot-ball team is practising vigorously each afternoon on the Victoria grounds. Under the guidance of Captain Donnelly, the boys are rapidly rounding into shape. The team has some fast material and should give a good account of itself. It is announced that High School and Rothesay will play a series of matches on the gridiron. Last year the local boys proved victorious, but the collegians will have considerable added strength during the present season. The locals will also meet Fredericton and will possibly extend their play to Moncton and Woodstock. They are confident of again lowering the colors of the fast fifteen from the capital. While it is as yet early to state definitely the make-up of the team, the backs will probably be: Donnelly, Walsh, Macdonald and Melrose, while Anglin will guard full. Vice-Captain Gorman has a strong scrim, which should give a good account of itself. Macdonald will again figure at quarter. The formation of a city intermediate league is being discussed, but no action has as yet been taken. A number of last year's Micmac teams will appear in senior company during this season.

GETTING AT THAT BOULDER

This morning the diver and crew of the dredge Cynthia were busy making preparations to raise the boulder lying in berth six. Last Saturday while digging the dredge Fielding struck the top of this rock and knocked the lips off several buckets in an effort to remove it. The average depth now reached at this berth is thirty-four feet and the top of this rock, which is quite a large one, protruded above ground about sixteen inches. Quite a quantity of rock has been found at the bottom. Tenders are about completed and the Fielding is expected to continue digging tomorrow.

STOLEN BOOTS WERE OF LITTLE BENEFIT

Seamen from the Bornu Soon Landed in Jail

Had No Time to Buy Whiskey With the Proceeds of the Robbery—Case Adjourned.

The Elder Dempster Line steamer Bornu sailed last night for Mexican and Cuban ports with a good general cargo. Six of the steamer's crew got drunk and deserted the ship, and six new men had to be shipped in their places. Of the half dozen deserters five of the number found their way to the police station.

Joe Fleming, Dennis Martin and Wm. Stewart were arrested for being drunk together on Princess street, while two others, Charles Healey an Englishman, and Thomas Pierce, a Scotchman, were arrested on the charge of stealing two pairs of leather top boots from J. M. Humphrey and Co.'s establishment on King street.

These two men pleaded not guilty to stealing in the police court this morning.

Edwin B. Cochran, a clerk in the Humphrey store, gave evidence of preparing a parcel containing two pairs of boots valued at \$3 a pair. He identified the stolen boots as the ones he had handled yesterday afternoon.

C. Percy Humphrey, a member of the firm, told the court how it was reported to him that the boots were stolen and of his notifying the police.

Mr. Humphrey said he did not desire to prosecute the defendants.

The magistrate said that it was the desire of the crown to prosecute all thieves, and if they were found guilty there would not be any suspended sentences.

David S. Roberts, a clerk in the Humphrey store, gave evidence that he put the parcel of boots on a packing case, near the door on King street about 5:45 o'clock yesterday, and a few minutes afterwards the parcel was stolen.

Roy Crawford, another clerk, said he saw a short man who somewhat resembled Healey pick up the parcel and walk away with it.

Detective Killen gave evidence that with Deputy Chief Jenkins he worked on the case, and seeing Pierce and Healey coming out of Charles Magnusson's store on Dock street, they made enquiries and learned that the two men sold him the two pairs of boots each received \$125. The two were then arrested and when questioned Healey said he owned the boots and bought them in Halifax.

When asked a statement Pierce said that he met Healey on the street. Healey had a parcel of boots which he asked Pierce to try and sell for him. Healey said he got the boots in Halifax. Pierce said that he did not know that the boots were stolen.

Healey testified that the boots were given him to sell by a sailor named Carroll on board the ship and that Carroll claimed to have bought the boots in Halifax. The money derived from sale of the shoes was to have been used in buying a couple of bottles of whiskey.

The case was adjourned until this afternoon when the evidence of Charles Magnusson will be taken.

CHILD RESTORED AND SUIT IS ENDED

Mrs. James McManus Appeared in Court

This Morning and Returned Little Rita Humphrey to Her Mother.

The suit brought by Mrs. Ralph Humphrey of Cambridge, Mass., against Jas. McManus of Hampton, for the recovery of her three year old daughter Rita, was brought to a conclusion this morning, when Mrs. McManus appeared in court with the child and returned her to her mother.

Yesterday before Judge McKewen, McManus pleaded that his wife had left his home with the child and he had no knowledge of her whereabouts. He was instructed to find out where she was and have the child on hand as soon as possible.

This morning Mrs. McManus appeared with the little girl and restored her to her mother, thus bringing the suit, which had been brought under the Habeas Corpus Act, to an abrupt termination.

D. Mullin and E. S. Ritchie appeared for the plaintiff, and J. B. M. Baxter for the defendant.

NEXT TUESDAY FIXED AS FIRST OF DOG DAYS

Three Hundred Owners Have Failed to Take Out Licenses.

Next Tuesday will be dog day in the police court and as usual there will be more excuses than fines taken.

The court officers have been pretty busy for the past couple of days making out the summonses for those who failed to take out licenses for their dogs on the first of May.

There are over three hundred persons who did not take out licenses at the required time. If they had done so it would have cost only two dollars, by taking licenses now they will pay four dollars and are liable to a fine of seven dollars besides.

If all the people respond to the summonses on Tuesday the court room will hardly be large enough to hold the crowd.
