WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 11.—Because an independent steamship line to the Isthmus of Panama on the Pacific coast would enter into competiwas given as a reason today for the rejection by Secretary of War Dickinson, of an offer to the government by a syndicate of Baltimoreans.

The details of the offer were give to the senate committee on inter-oceanic canals, by B. N. Baker, former president of a Baltimore line, during a hearing on the Flint-McLachlan bill for the establishment of a government-owned line on the west coast.

Mr. Baker said that when the Pacific Mail S. S. Company gave notice that it would insist upon receiving seventy per cent. of the joint rate on business via the Isthmus, instead of the fifty per cent, it had received for a number of years, he offered to put on a line if he was given a mail contract similar to those given to other lines, Such a line as he proposed to establish, said Mr. Baker, would have connected with the government vessels between New York and Colon.

"Why was your offer rejected," asked Senator Bristow.

Mr. Baker replied that the secretary of war was of the opinion he had no jurisdiction in the matter. He added that he understood Postmaster General Hitchcock would have favored the plan if it had met with the approval of the head of the war department.
