The annual meeting of the St. John Cricket Club will be held tomorrow night in Wilt's Restaurant at 8 p. m. The executive are giving a smoker and refreshments in connection with the meeting and they hope not only the members, but all those interested in cricket will attend.

Another large audience heard Evangelist Matheson in Tabernacle Church last evening with great interest, again the church was crowded to the doors, and at the close of the service many came forward and signified their intention of living a better life. Mr. Matheson will speak again this evening. All welcome.

The special services in the Victoria Street Baptist Church continue to be largely attended. Last evening Rev. E. H. Nobles delivered an interesting sermon on: "How Shall We Escape if We Neglect the Great Salvation?" There was a hearty response at the close of the sermon. The educational department promises to be one of the most valuable features of the coming Dominion exhibition. The educational authorities of the province have promised to contribute an interesting exhibit showing the work of the manual training and domestic science schools.

The natural resources of New Brunswick will be given a large amount of space and special attention will be paid to the products of the forests and mines. A splendid forestry display is assured and every economic species of wood will be shown. The wood will be shown in its natural grain and also polished for use and the leaf and fruit will also be shown. It is hoped to have charts showing the timber areas of the Dominion with the location of the different varieties of timber growth. Plans are also on foot for lectures on forestry subjects to be given in the morning as is done in the dairy and cattle departments.

A large display of minerals is expected to make it as complete as possible. The technical schools of Canada are being asked to give an exhibit illustrative of their work and this feature is receiving the support of the Canadian manufacturers' Association.

DIDN'T LIKE THE HUG, BUT BROUGHT IT ON HERSELF

Maggie Gray Grew Tired of Harvey's Attention But Had Poor Luck in Shaking Him.

John A. Haney the Englishman who was last evening arrested by Officer Lucas on a charge of persistently following a Scotch girl named Maggie Gray and putting his arms around her waist, appeared before Police Magistrate Ritchie in the police court this morning.

Edward J. Lane, of the West Side, testified that he saw the prisoner and Maggie in the "Do-drop-in" restaurant last evening. He had his arm around her waist. Witness said to Harvey, "You want to get on to yourself or you'll be arrested." Harvey said (to Maggie), "Come on, and never mind him." Witness further stated that he heard the girl telling Harvey to go back and mind his own business. This he didn't do, but followed her out as far as the Dominion Coal Company pocket and back to the restaurant again.

The girl was crying because she couldn't get rid of the Englishman, and witness sympathized with her, and told her he would take her to his house in Charlton for the night. This he did later on in the evening.

Officer Lucas gave evidence in his own defense. He said the other day when he was being paid off at his ship the Scotch girl came up to him and spoke to him. He had never seen her before. He was in the "Do drop in" restaurant last evening when she came in. She recognized him and shook hands with him. After partaking of a repast she suggested going for a walk, but later on wanted to "shake" him. The girl had asked him if he would take her way back to Glasgow on the Athena.

The case was adjourned until two o'clock this afternoon, when the prisoner will be disposed of.

MONMOUTH IS HERE; THE MONMOUTH COMING

Later Will Dock Early This Afternoon—Two Steamers are to Sail Tomorrow.

C. P. R. steamer Montreal, from London via Antwerp, reached port and docked at Sand Point at 11:45 o'clock this morning after a rough passage. The steamer brought 212 passengers. Most of the number are Englishmen en route to the West. The officers on the steamer report strong head winds throughout the trip. The steamer left London on Friday, February 24.

A little girl in the stowage was ill with measles during the trip. She was placed under the physician's care. On reaching Partridge Island the child with the father and mother, were placed in the quarantine building. There was no spread of the disease.

Allan liner Virginia, with 1500 passengers on board, will reach Halifax early tomorrow morning from Liverpool. She will arrive here and dock on Saturday afternoon.

Allan liner Hesperian, now at No. one berth, and C. P. R. steamer Empress of Britain, will sail for Liverpool via Halifax tomorrow. The steamers will carry a fairly large number of passengers.

C. P. R. steamer Monmouth, from Bristol will reach Partridge Island at four o'clock this afternoon. She will dock immediately at Sand Point.

DESSERTERS ARRESTED

Daniel George, aged 33, and William Mack, aged 28, two deserters from the West India steamer Dahome, lying at Long Wharf, were arrested about one o'clock this afternoon by Deputy Chief Jenkins and Sgt. Campbell. They are charged with being absent from the ship without leave, they being articulated seamen.

The two jolly tars deserted the ship last night and this morning the captain complained to Chief Clark about the matter and asked to have the two arrested. The police officers found the sailors in a house in Union street this afternoon and arrested them. George is a native of Barbados, and Clark hails from Jamaica. They will be arraigned in the police court this afternoon. In all likelihood they will be allowed to go, as the steamer sails this afternoon at three o'clock, and the captain wants them on the ship.
