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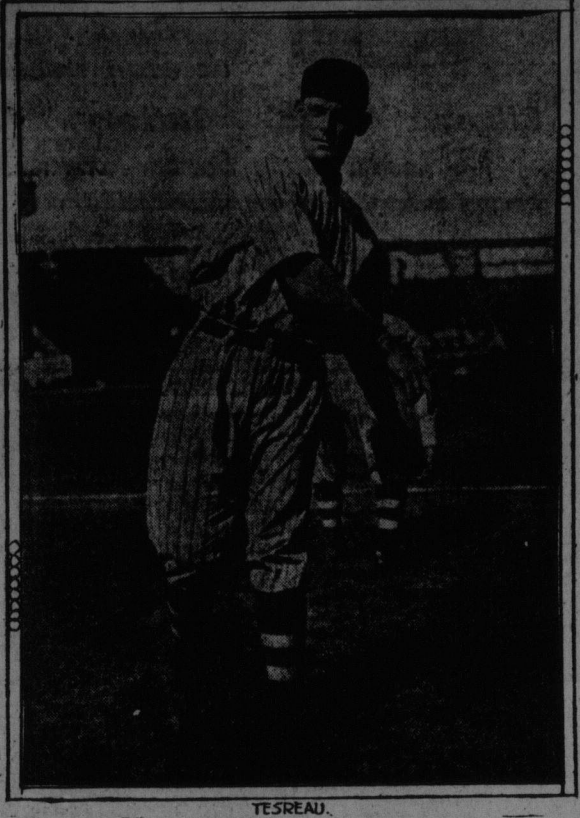
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"BIG JEFF" PITCHING STAR BALL.

England, France and the United States favor Boxing at Olympics.

With the meeting of delegates representing all the principal amateur athletic associations of Europe and America in Lyons, France, tomorrow, and the subsequent session of the Olympic Congress in Paris, many matters of great importance to the sporting world are on the verge of settlement. The International Amateur Athletic Federation's conference will be attended by a number of prominent athletic officials from this side of the Atlantic, and the Olympic Congress, opening at Paris next Saturday, will also find America well represented. Not the least of the questions to be taken up by the Olympic Congress will be the inclusion of boxing in the next Olympics at Athens. The athletic game has long been a bone of contention in Olympic circles, but everything indicates that it is now to come into its own. The proposal of including boxing in the Berlin program will be backed by the American delegation, but it will have the staunch backing of the Amateur Boxing Association of England and the French Amateur Boxing Club. With these three powerful nations back of it, the proposal seems assured of success, although there may be some opposition from Germany and Sweden. Boxing has never become popular in those countries, but there is no reason why the Germans and Swedes should not develop some clever boxers before the opening of the Olympics. As an example of what men of German blood can accomplish in the "manly art," one has but to point to the records of such professionals as Willie Ritchie, Ad Wolgast, Billy Papke, Frank Klaus, Leo Houck, Knockout Brown, Frank Mantell, Freddie Hicks and many others. Batters, Nelson, Kid, Williams, and other Northern, have also shone in the ring. Historically considered, boxing should by all means be included in the Olympic contests, as the ancient Greeks were proficient in the manly art. Their methods are scarcely to be recommended, however, as the ancient pugilists were on their hands instruments called "caestus," which were about as soft as modern brass knuckles. The adoption of boxing as an Olympic sport will doubtless give a great impetus to the game, and within a few years, it is safe to predict, the glove contest will have a large amateur following in all the countries of the world.

THIS DATE IN RING ANNALS

1824—Tom Spring defeated Jack Lang in 77 rounds at Chichester, England. Spring, whose real name was Thomas Winter, had succeeded "Old Tom" Cribb as champion of England, while Lang, a native of County Kildare and an ex-soldier, had fought his way to the top of the heap in Ireland. Some 40,000 spectators gathered about the ring, which was pitched in open field, to see the memorable conflict between Englishman and Ireland. Thousands of sports had come over from the Emerald Isle and they backed Lang with everything they owned, in a vain endeavor to cover all the Spring money in sight. Howling, the local inn-keeper, was in charge of the arrangements for the battle, having purchased all privileges from the fighters for \$500 each, and as the first pugilistic promoter he accumulated a fortune from his investment. The battle lasted nearly two hours and a half, and the Irishman fought gamely all the way, but in the end he was vanquished by the more experienced Englishman. It is said that many Irish families now living in England are the descendants of those Irish sports who wagered all they possessed on Lang, and didn't have enough money left to get home. Jack Dempsey made his first appearance in a 2-round exhibition with John L. Sullivan at a benefit given for Dempsey at Madison Square Garden, York.

GOOD NEWS FOR TURF FOLLOWERS

It will be good news for the followers of horse racing throughout the city to learn that in all probability their favorite sport will boom here this season. Its understood the race track at Moosepath has been taken over for the season and the program which proved so popular during last summer will be again continued this season.

With the speed already quartered in our vicinity and with what interest the recent news of the railroads guessing and furnish a most creditable program. It is understood also an enthusiast of Fairville, while another from Carleton has on the way at present something that will make them sit up and take notice in the speed line and it is only a matter of a very few days until foreign speed will grace the course.

The opening of the season's program is scheduled for Tuesday, June 16 and entries are now in order for two classes on that day, together with the much talked of race between Pearl Barronmore and Black Bees for a consideration of \$200. Black Bees is the mare who on May 25, at Moncton, brought first honors to St. John in her class, defeating a fast field of horses from New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. She is owned by Wm. P. McDonald and is at present at Fredericton under the careful handling of Wm. Sherron, the gentleman who drove her a winner at Moncton and who will again handle her at her next appearance at Moosepath on the 16th.

Her competitor is no other than owned by Mr. McDonald, but now the property of W. J. Thompson. She has been getting her preparation for the meeting under the care of Thos. Hayes who will drive her and it is expected her appearance this season will be as popular as ever.

A crew of men will be put to work at once to put the track in proper shape for some fast heats. It is the intention to practically put a new bot in the course, the turns and stretches are to be widened and restored to their former good condition.
