

## AFRAID WILSON WILL TREAT THE HUN AS A BEATEN BUT HONORABLE ENEMY

France Believes He Does Not Understand the German as He Really is and Regret That He Has Not Had the Benefit of Residence in Europe—Statesmen Do Not Understand Why the Allies Should, at the Cost of Their Own Inconvenience, Provide Food to Those Who Have Brought on Their Own Impoverishment.

Paris, Nov. 26.—While inclined to offer every respect to President Wilson and his humanitarian principles, as exemplified by his evident desire to deal as mildly as possible with the now defeated Boches, Paris finds it difficult to sympathize with what it believes to be the American President's wish to revictualize the hungry Germans at the expense of the Allied people, who have had such a terrible struggle in beating them. The whole matter has just received concerted demonstration here in the reply made by Clavelle, French minister of railways, in regard to the transport crisis. Clavelle predicted that the shortage of rolling stock will certainly increase rather than diminish owing to the fact that "we shall have to revictualize Germany and Austria." What Frenchmen cannot understand is why after having won the victory in the war that was none of their seeking, the Allies should be expected to come to the rescue, at their own expense, of the very people who by their own thousandfold guilt have themselves to thank for the plight in which they find themselves today.

It is not overlooked here that by maintaining the blockade of Germany until perhaps the signing of peace, the Allies are practically preventing the Boches from revictualizing themselves. As a means of inducing them to sign whatever conditions the Allies may decide to impose this method is undoubtedly sound. The Germans are anxious for a quiet return of the days of light and we are anxious to have them again in a position where they cannot again inflict the awful ordeal we suffered during the last four years. But it must not be forgotten that the Germans themselves are the cause of the privations they are enduring, and if anybody is to go on suffering it does not seem reasonable, the average Frenchman avers, that it should be the Allies.

What people are rather afraid of is that Wilson may allow himself to be too much inclined to treat the Boches as a beaten but honorable enemy, with whom the dictators of humanity necessitate a resumption of friendly relations as soon as possible. Wilson, said a middle-aged Frenchman of good position in life, to me today, does not know the Germans; they really are. He knows only Germans who have lived many years in the United States and who, in the nature of things, are much better disposed to the Germans than the majority of men then their brothers at home.

The report published here tonight that Wilson will probably be in Europe before the end of the year has been received here with great interest. What many people here regret, however, is that the President has never had the benefit of twelve months' residence, say, in Sovergne, where he would have been able to see the Boches as they really are.

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## HAIG PRAISES U. S. TROOPS

American Corps Heartily Thanked for Their Achievement on Leaving British Front.

With the British Army in Belgium, Sunday, Nov. 24, (By the A. P.)—A letter from Field Marshal Haig, the British commander-in-chief, to the commander of the American Second Corps, which served with the British Fourth Army during the closing days of the war, reads:

"Now that you are leaving the British zone I wish again to thank you and all the officers, non-commissioned officers and men on behalf of myself and all ranks of the British armies in France and Flanders for the very gallant and efficient service you have rendered during your operations with the British Fourth Army."

"On the 29th of September you participated with distinction in a great and critical attack which shattered the enemy's resistance on the Hindenburg line and which opened the road to victory."

"The deeds of the 27th and 30th American Divisions, which took Bellecourt and Nauroy and gallantly sustained the desperate struggle for Bony will rank with the highest achievements of the war."

"The names of Brancourt, Premont, Esniguy, Vaux-Andigny, St. Souplet and Wassigny will testify to the dash and energy of your attack. I am proud to have had you in my command."

## BRITAIN WILL NEED ALL SHIPS

To Bring Her Overseas Troops Home—She Has Carried a Million U. S. Soldiers With a Loss of Less Than Five Hundred.

New York, Nov. 26.—A statement made here today from authoritative sources regarding the part British ships have taken in the transportation of the American army overseas, revealed the fact that Great Britain may be compelled soon to use all her available transports for the return of her troops of the British Empire.

The majority of these forces, it was explained, have been away from their homes for periods ranging from two to four years, and in addition there are in England large numbers of wounded colonial soldiers awaiting transportation home.

Discussing what Great Britain has done toward moving American troops abroad, it was authoritatively stated here today that British vessels carried 1,046,087 troops to England and France during the war from the embarkation ports at Newport News, Baltimore, New York, Boston, Portland, Me., and Montreal.

These voyages 563 in number and involving 190 British ships, terminated on September 31, 1918. The record was set by the Olympic, which transported 53,830 American troops.

Of the more than a million troops carried, fewer than 500 were lost through mishaps.

## MAKE GERMANY BUILD SHIPS FOR THE ALLIES

London, Nov. 26.—The government has adopted the programme framed by the late Albert Ballin, director of the Hamburg-American Line, and the shipowners' union, binding Germany to build ships exclusively for the Allies at fixed prices, in return for which Germany will retain her merchant fleet, says a despatch to the Daily Express from Amsterdam.

Luxemburg, November 26.—Marschall Foch, the Allied commander-in-chief, has established headquarters here. He arrived in Luxemburg yesterday with his staff. No ceremonies were held in honor of his entrance.

## PRELIMINARY PEACE MUST SAVE GERMANY

Country Cannot go on Without Trouble Unless Armistice Terms Are Modified.

Basle, Switzerland, Nov. 26.—Accounts of the conference of the representatives of the German federal states in Berlin received here quote Chancellor Ebert as declaring that a preliminary peace alone could save Germany. Unless the armistice was modified, he urged, the worst consequences would result.

The meeting also discussed the report of Matthias Erzberger, head of the armistice commission, regarding the conditions of the armistice.

## AUSTRIA ILL-TREATING ITALIAN PRISONERS

Setting Them Free All at Once Without Food and Poorly Clad.

Rome, Nov. 21.—Austria-Hungary is violating the armistice by releasing Italian prisoners without food and poorly clad, says an official note issued through the Stefani Agency. The Italians also are being set free all at once instead of in successive sections.

The note adds: "The enemy's last attempt to trouble the natural development of our operations and exasperate the population of the liberated regions has succeeded only in prolonging the sufferings of the prisoners without effecting their faith in their country."

## RECEPTION TO GOVERNOR-GENERAL

Fredericton, Nov. 26.—According to the programme made in the official programme of the reception to the Governor-General he will address the Normal School and public schools at the Opera House on Tuesday morning, and the civic colleges will be given in the council chamber at ten o'clock. Other items on the program will remain the same as previously announced.

## POLITICALLY ALL ROUMANIA IS NOW IN THE MELTING POT

The Country Has Been Wholly Evacuated by the Germans and Roumanian Troops are Invading Transylvania, But Will Not Enter Hungary, as Has Been Stated by Germany—The Outlook in Roumania is for a Readjustment of the Property Law, Under Which Great Estates Will be Broken up.

Paris, Nov. 26.—Despatches received here from Roumania indicate that reports current to the effect that Roumanian divisions are advancing with the intention of invading Hungary proper, are of German origin.

Roumanian troops eventually occupy Transylvania and Bukovina, the evacuation of which has been demanded by the Roumanian government, it will be only with the consent of the Allied powers.

In any case the occupation will not surpass the line dividing Hungary proper from Transylvania.

The first step toward conveying back to Roumanian refugees who had fled at the beginning of the German invasion, will leave Marseilles and Constantinople in about a week's time.

Now that Roumania has been evacuated by German troops and that those of the Allies have arrived, a complete change in the mental outlook has occurred throughout the country. Roumanians have disappeared.

The few supporters of Marghiteanu, who have not yet left Bucharest and Jassy for their country estates, appear to have been so overwhelmed by events that they give the impression of being under the influence of a bad dream.

Politically the whole of Roumania is now in the melting pot. No striking change will occur probably until the completion of the work of accomplishing Roumanian unity, which will result in the incorporation of Transylvania and the other regions still under foreign domination as a part of Roumania's kingdom.

For the moment the whole people is content to await this development. At the same time, as in other Allied countries, a definite movement has been started with a view to punishing those who have been guilty of treasonable acts, espionage, and misappropriation and a wholly new programme of radical reforms, political, economic, and especially agrarian, is being developed.

Roumania is a country of large landed proprietors. New laws with the object of breaking up the great estates had either been passed or were about to be passed when the war broke out. The policy of the Marghiteanu government was not only to delay the coming into force of these agrarian reforms, but to whittle them down by modifications in the interest of the great land owners. Their whole object will be defeated in the whole situation has been produced through the fact that the incorporation in Roumania of Transylvania, Bukovina and Bessarabia, will result in an increase in the total population from between five and six millions to nearly sixteen millions. This will inevitably mean, in view of the character of the new Roumanian population, a complete change in the national political outlook of the Roumanian people. Henceforward the intellectual classes of Transylvania, Bessarabia and Bukovina, together with the very important Jewish element, are expected to play a very considerable part in the life of new Roumania.
