

British Miners Accept Offer of Government

A despatch from London says:-The members of the Miners' Federation, by a majority of 65,125 votes, has de-cided to accept the Government's ofer of a 20 per cent. increase on gross earnings. The decision of the men obviates the danger of a strike.

The Government's offer provides for a minimum flat advance of two shillings for all workers over 18 years of age, one shilling for workers between 16 and 18, and ninepence for workers under 16 years.
