## MILLIONS SAVED TO FARMERS BY WAR ON INSECTS

Minister of Agriculture Says Benefit To Manitoba Crops \$17,000,000.

### VARIOUS ITEMS PASSED

Discussion Over Government Railways Statement Is Postponed To Committee.

OTTAWA, March 17.—(Canadian Press).—When Hon. Dr. Ret. minister of railways, concluded his House today his annual statement on the government railways, Speaker Rhodes suggested that any discussion on the statement should be postponed until the House was in committee. He pointed out that the number of questions which could be asked when the Speaker was in the chair was necessarily limited.

The Opposition agreed to the postponement of the discussion, and the House went into committee of supply on the estimates of the department of agriculture.

Saved \$17,000,000. Hon. Dr. Toynbee, minister of agriculture, spoke of what had been done in the campaign against both animal and vegetable parasites. Last year \$17,000,000 was saved to the farmers of Manitoba. Yast acreages in Saskatchewan and Alberta had been protected. In lighter vein, Dr. Toynbee described to an amused House how anti-pest corps, using molasses as a bait, had destroyed grasshoppers with bran, sawdust and arsenic.

And Dr. Toynbee emphasized the value to farmers of the department's work in general.

Col. J. A. Currie (North Simcoe) had a word on the farms of Ontario and Quebec. These farms, he declared to the House, would be worth one hundred per cent more if it were not for the "Weeping Willows" who went around knocking them. He was critical, too, of farmers who devoted more time to politics than farming.

Some Criticism. Later in the evening there was some criticism of the way which built inspectors are appointed. William Dug (Lanarkshire, N. S.) thought that instead of being made by the civil service commission they should be made by the minister or his deputy.

J. A. Maharg (Maple Creek) also urged the necessity of better fruit inspection on the prairies.

Items were passed of \$25,000 for entomology; \$180,000 for the destruction of the destructive insect and pest; \$175,000 for dairying; and \$26,000 for cold storage.

During question time in the afternoon session Sir George Foster told Hon. Charles Murphy that since the armistice Russian subjects were privileged to travel to Canada and Canadians with Russia. The treaty between Great Britain and Soviet Russia was made irrespective of other countries.

## PICKS FLAWS IN LONDON SYSTEM

Brantford Assessor Declares Too Much Guesswork Will Result.

BRANTFORD, March 17.—Assessor A. G. Ludlow today declared himself against the assessment system which has been introduced in London, Ont. He stated that such a system depended too much on guesswork, and an equalized assessment was not possible. There would be a large amount of work to be done, and the judgment of more than one man in determining the multiple used in the system for a certain road would vary considerably. Changes for the local system have not yet been worked out.

## RECTOR VICTIM OF SLEEPING SICKNESS

Rev. W. F. Brownlee Was Graduate of Huron College.

ST. THOMAS, March 17.—After an illness of six weeks from sleeping sickness, Rev. W. F. Brownlee, rector of St. John's Anglican Church, died this afternoon in his 55th year. Mr. Brownlee was born in Huron County, and was a graduate of Huron College and the Western University. He was ordained deacon in 1881, by the late Bishop Baldwin, and to priesthood in 1882. Mr. Brownlee had been rector in Biddulph, Ridgeway and Southampton before coming to St. John's Church in 1910. Besides his wife, formerly Miss Lillian Hamby of Harrison, Ont. he leaves five daughters and a son.

## CONSTABLE KILLED AS REPRISAL FOR RECENT EXECUTIONS

Three Bombs Are Thrown At a Lorry in Dublin.

DUBLIN, March 17.—As a reprisal for the execution Monday of Thomas Whelan in Mountjoy Prison, Constable O'Kane was shot dead in Clifden, County Galway, last night, and another constable was wounded. Crown forces made searches to discover the authors of the shooting, and shot to death John McDonald who attempted to evade arrest.

## PROPERTY RIGHTS ARE NOT AFFECTED

Attorney-General's Bill Is Reported by Legal Committee.

TORONTO, March 17.—The legal committee of the Legislature this afternoon reported Hon. W. E. Raney's bill providing that children born out of wedlock shall be deemed to be legitimate upon the marriage of their parents. Property rights vested before such marriages will not be affected. An amendment to the bill was made providing that when a married man goes through a form of marriage with another woman, that his legal wife is living, the second woman and her progeny shall have a lien upon any estate he may have at his death.

## BIG TRUCK STALLED IN MUD AT HARRISTON

HARRISTON, March 17.—The large truck used by the Wellington Produce Company was mired so deeply in the mud on Margaret street last night that the chauffeur was compelled to abandon it. This is the first time in the history of the town that a truck has been stuck in mud to the extent that it has been in.

## VETERAN CLERK HAS TENDERED RESIGNATION

INGERSOLL, March 17.—After continuous service of 25 years as clerk of the Ingersoll branch of the National Bank, Alex. Bell has resigned as clerk of the bank at a meeting on Monday.

## FOUR WARSHIPS OF HOOD CLASS ARE PLANNED

Huge Battleships, Oil Burning, With 15-Inch Guns.

### POLICY OF ECONOMY

British Admiralty, However, Will Not Sacrifice Efficiency in Any Way.

LONDON, March 17.—The House of Commons tonight passed the naval estimates for 1921-22. The estimates amount to £91,186,889 gross and £82,479,000 net.

London, March 17.—Four capital warships of the Hood class will be laid down within a year, Sir James Craig, parliamentary and financial secretary to the admiralty, announced in the House of Commons today. The Hood is a battle cruiser of 41,200 tons, normal displacement, and of 4,500 tons with a full load. She carries eight 15-inch guns, two 5.5-inch anti-aircraft guns, four 3-inch anti-aircraft guns, and has two submerged torpedo tubes and four above water. The vessel was launched August 1918 and has a complement of 1,475 men. She is an oil-burner.

In introducing the naval estimates, the secretary to the admiralty emphasized the economies effected, which, he said, were not a matter for the admiralty, but a policy which the government had deliberately adopted. Lord Lee, first lord of the admiralty, in his speech of yesterday, had done his utmost to show that the policy was not to hold out the olive branch to the United States, but at all events to show that "in our policy we are restraining ourselves entirely to the maintenance of the one-power standard, and that standard was a highly efficient one, such as would maintain the old traditions of the British navy."

## MEANS BIG SAVING

In order to effect further economies, said Sir James, arrangements have been made to restrict to the greatest possible extent consistent with efficiency, the steaming of the squadrons, and, if political conditions did not exist upon the navy as to prevent this, it was intended to reduce allowances to a degree which would enable the admiralty to show a saving of £300,000.

Referring to the closing of the dockyards at Pembroke and Paul Bowline, he said the decision had been taken reluctantly, but it was necessary to the primary position. This would last a year.
