The Lumber Trade.

QUEBEC, March 16.—At a meeting of the Executive Council held to-day, at which were present the Hon. Messrs. Chapleau, Lynch, Flynn and Paquet, a deputation of lumbermen, comprising the following gentlemen, was received:—Peter White, M. P.; J. R. Booth, R. Bronson, of Ottawa; Alex. Baptist, James Dean and Joseph Reynar, of St. Maurice; L. A. Robitaille, F. Carbray, M. Girouard, of Lower St. Lawrence, together with the following lumber merchants resident in Quebec:—Jas. Ross, F. McNaughton, Leandre Methot, G. B. Hall, E. Beaudet, Henry King, D. C. Thompson, Robt. Hamilton, W. G. Ross, C. Penland, Andrew Thompson, W. Quinn, Henry Atkinson and John Koch. A petition was presented on their behalf by Hon. L. R. Church, Q. C., whose address occupied over two hours in its delivery, and was an exhaustive review of the legislation in connection with the question of the licenses issued by the Government, and an argument in favor of the lumbermen being put beyond question, not merely in the interest of lumbermen, but on the broader grounds of public policy. At the close of his address, the hon. gentleman received the congratulations of the deputation on the very able and lucid exposition of the petition which he had presented.
