member seeing one stranger in the house. The back parlour of which I speak is connected with the front parlour by folding doors which will be exactly the kind of thing which I presume you would want.

I received the receipt which you enclosed for goods from Bisbee, but up to the present time have not had any not-ification of their arrival. As soon as they come, I will take them in and notify you.

I see no reason why you should not tell Norman of what I wrote to you, though it would be well not to disclose the source of his knowledge. I see they have appointed Dr. Brown medical superintendent. This may be somewhat different than the suggested arrangement, but I know with my talk with Mr. Flavell that the original plan was to do what I suggested. Norman could see that he had learned that this was what had to be done. If you see Dr. Jimmy Ross you might speak to him about it, as it was Dr. Ross and Mr. Flavell who were disdussing the matter at the time I got my information.

I am glad you think you will be able to stay at St.

Catharines to the end of September as it will give me a chance to take during that time the holiday which I hope to have.

You will have time after you come down to see a little of Kingsmere by going up for a Saturday and Sunday or a longer time, for
