

PARKHILL.

An incorporated village and station of the Grand Trunk Railway, in the township of West Williams. The village was first settled about the year 1863, and since that time has rapidly increased in wealth and population, and bids fair in a few years to be one of the most important towns west of Toronto. The adjacent country is one of the most fertile in the Province, and large quantities of produce grain and timber are shipped from this station. There are a number of fine buildings recently erected, and many others are contemplated. The several religious denominations have churches here. The Mechanics' Institute has a well selected library, and if, as is anticipated, a new county should be formed, the chances are that this place will arrive at the dignity of a county town. Distant from London 32 miles, 40 from Sarnia, and 128 from Toronto. Population about 2,500.
