SMART AIR TRIPS.

(London Times, July 25.) An aeroplane taxi journey of nearly 1,500 miles has been accomplished during the week-end. Late on Friday night a Dutch business man in Amsterdam received a telegram summoning him urgently to Berlin. He chartered at once at D.H.9 taxi-plane from the Royal Dutch Air Service, the pilot being Mr. Hinchliffe. Leaving the aerodrome at 3.15 a.m. on Saturday morning, the Machine reached Berdin in time for the passenger to breakfast at an hotel before 9 o'clock. Keeping the aeroplane waiting the business man spent the morning and afternoon in Berlin. and then flew back to Amsterdam at

100 miles an hour. 
