Local and General

The Rev. Thomas Stewart, D. D. of Halifax, will conduct both services at Greenock church next Sunday.

There will be a sale of Fancy articles at Mrs. Bottrell's grounds, Orchard House, Boabec, on Saturday afternoon, the proceeds of which will be devoted to church expenses. Afternoon tea, ice-cream, cake, etc., will be served.

We note with pleasure that the small lot of land near the centre of the town, owned by the Methodist Church and in former years used as a cemetery, but for a long time lying waste and exposed, has been cleaned of all rubbish and enclosed by a neat flag wire fence.

Prof. E. E. Prince, Dominion Fisheries Commissioner, has returned to Ottawa after a visit to Rainy River and Lake of the Woods. During the visit he gave important evidence at the sittings of the International Waterways Commission at Warroad and Fort Francis, Minn. Prof. Prince has a most complete and accurate knowledge of the fisheries in the waters mentioned, on both sides of the boundary, having frequently inspected them during the past twenty years. These fisheries used to yield enormous quantities of sturgeon, the roe of which (caviare) was sent to Russia and Germany. The product, though Canadian, was shipped from American ports and Canada got neither credit nor profit for the industry. Much of this caviare found its way back to the United States and Canada as "Russian Caviare," in transit.

One of the most interesting features of the County Exhibition at St. Stephen last week was the exhibit and demonstration of mattress-making by the local firm of F. W. & S. Mason. The front of their booth was very prettily decorated with mattress fillings of Cotton, Layer Felt and Lyhay Fibre entwined with patriotic ribbons. Inside the booth a small factory was being worked. "Mattresses made while you wait." Hanging all around were catches and well-washed show-cards explaining the firm's products and merits, making a very attractive and particularly good show.

A special feature of their booth was a little incident of the Fair, which proved to be an exceptionally good drawing card. It was some little children weary and tired of the hum and turmoil of the Fair, put to sleep on the mattresses on show, enjoying a little nap, while all around was hustle and several pianos playing, also a band out outside; still the weary little ones slept on, at last awaking refreshed from a perfect sleep on the sleep-producing "Algonquin" bedding. "This was our biggest ad," says Manager Sam Mason, "and was a big, big, attraction. The firm speak well of the interest taken in their exhibit, and feel very pleased with the result of their enterprise.

Charlotte County Exhibition AT ST. STEPHEN

The result of years of earnest endeavor is well reflected in the big fair that is now in progress on the King street grounds.

Every department is filled to overflowing and new features are added that have never before been seen here. It assuredly is the best fair that has ever been seen in this section.

Over one hundred and thirty head of choice cattle are on the grounds, the gathering of horses and all other live stock is in proportion and the vegetables are magnificent in quality and in unusual abundance.

The exhibit made by the government experimental farm and the demonstrations given in connection are attracting a lot of attention. The exhibit is unique in its arrangement and gives a good demonstration of what can be accomplished with the soil of this province.

The ladies, as usual, have done well their part and the fancy work, fine arts and domestic science departments are a delight to all.

The fruit exhibit is the finest that has yet been made and is at all times a centre of attraction.

The display of flowers and plants is magnificent, and superior to any that has been undertaken.

The fishermen make a splendid display, and the biological station exhibit is, as always, a center of interest.

The Midway is a live one, and there is not a dull or uninteresting spot on the grounds.

The free attractions surpass any ever seen at a down-east fair, and that is saying quite a lot, when some of the former attractions on the same grounds are recalled.

Major Laughlin is in charge of a recruiting tent erected on the grounds.

THE FORMAL OPENING

The formal opening of the big exhibition on Tuesday evening was attended with pleasing ceremonies. G. W. Ganong presided and first introduced His Honour L.L. Governor Wood, who spoke of the pleasure that it afforded him to be present at the fair and to visit St. Stephen, which he described as one of the most pleasantly situated towns in the province; and also made a strong address on patriotic subjects.

Premier Clarke spoke briefly, and was followed by Hon. J. A. Murray, minister of agriculture, who spoke interestingly of the many features embraced in the policy of the government in relation to farming, and of some of the good that is being accomplished. Each was given an attentive hearing by the large number who had gathered for this pleasing feature of the fair.

An east wind and cloudy mornings have interfered somewhat with the attendance up to the present, but the fair is well worth an effort to attend.—St. Croix Courier, Sept. 16.
