DIOCESAN SYNOD OF NEWFOUNDLAND

Resolutions of Sympathy Are Tendered to Parents and Relatives of Those Who Have Given Their Lives For King and Country—Committees Are Named by Bishop

Wednesday, July 12th. Pursuant to adjournment the House met at 3.30 p.m., The Lord Bishop presiding. After the usual devotional exercises, the rolls were called when 28 Clergy and 15 Lay Delegates responded. Minutes of previous meeting read, passed and signed by the Bishop. Debate on Education deferred. The Rev. W. J. R. Higgitt moved the following Resolution, which was seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Bayley and carried by a standing vote of the Synod. RESOLVED—That this Synod begs to tender its respectful sympathy to the parents and relatives of men of all ranks, of both Army and Navy, who have given their lives for King and Country, and to record with pride and gratitude the splendid eulogy of Sir Douglas Haig that "their deeds" of valour have never been surpassed. Rev. Facey in accordance with notice given asked for the accounts of Bishop Spencer Lodge. Mr. Blackall presented a statement of Revenue and Expenditure. Rev. A. C. Bayley's motion re Bishop Spencer Lodge Committee deferred. Rev. W. J. R. Higgitt's questions re spiritual needs of the Outport Volunteers—after some discussion a motion proposed by Canon Smith and seconded by Canon Colley, That the Bishop be asked to appoint a Chaplain from one of the City Clergy to look after the spiritual needs of the Volunteers, was carried. Rev. Rural Dean Pittman proposed that a vote of sympathy with Rev. Dr. Jones in his bereavement and other domestic troubles be recorded by this Synod; seconded by Rev. A. Tulk, D.A., and carried. Canon Bolt's question as to the appointments of the Standing Committees created quite a breezy discussion as to the mode of procedure. After several members of both sides of the House had expressed their views it was decided to leave the matter in the hands of the Bishop. The House rose at 5.15. Evening Session. The Lord Bishop took the chair at 7.30. After prayers, 32 Clergy and 32 Lay Delegates answered their names. THESE STRANDED VESSELS.

The "Inger," one of the stranded vessels at Langlade is a steel barque of 1,450 tons, and about 20 years old, but in splendid condition. She is about the size of the "Ravenscourt," which was here last year getting extensive repairs after being in collision with the S.S. "Allaguash" off Cape Race. She was from Pugwash, N.S., lumber-laden to England. The other two vessels are Danish and are the "Danmark" and "Ragnahill," also bound across with lumber. The crews of the three vessels are safe. If the weather moderates it is hoped to get the vessels off. They went on there as a result of thick fog and the heavy current which runs in on the St. Pierre Islands. The "Danmark" was in this port the past spring and left here for Nova Scotia to load lumber. Census Tasker Cook says that tugs are there from St. Pierre giving assistance and he is making all possible effort to have the ships, if possible, get off the rocks. HOW HE WAS KILLED. We hear today that the circumstances surrounding the death of Lieut. Owen Steele are very sad. This fine young officer had been in the trenches in the heaviest kind of fighting for 6 days and then went back to the billets with others. While there in a place supposed to be at least comparatively safe he was hit by a stray shell and so severely wounded that the poor chap died next day.
