Fending the report, which arrived too late to affect prices, all grain markets dragged, with wheat closing the same as last night at 1c to 11-4c off; corn down 1-4c to 3-4c and oats at a decline of 1-2c and 5-8c to 5-8c and 3-4c. In provisions the outcome ranged from 5c loss to a like advance. The Liverpool market closed ¼d higher to ¼d lower on wheat, and unchanged on corn. Antwerp, Berlin and Buda Pest all closed unchanged on wheat.
