James McKinnon, 27 years of age who resided at 26 Somerset street, Hamilton, and a former resident of Brantford, who had relatives here, was found in a dying condition on a country road one mile west of Stoney Creek by two farm hands on their way home. They endeavored to give medical aid for him and render what assistance they could, but he expired a few minutes after they discovered him. County Constable Springstead was notified and in turn notified Coroner Thompson, who ordered an inquest. The jury viewed the remains yesterday morning and adjourned until next Saturday night.

While the authorities at Stoney Creek had no theories to advance regarding how the deceased met his death, they intimated that he may have died from some sort of poisoning.

At local police headquarters it was learned that only yesterday afternoon Mrs. McKinnon and Rev. D. Skinner called on Inspector Campbell and asked him to start a search for the deceased, who had been missing since last Thursday. They expressed themselves as being anxious for his safety, as, when he left home he was melancholy over his inability to obtain work.

From another source it was gathered that McKinnon had set out on foot to get a job at Thorold, and his friends think he was overcome by exposure and succumbed to it.

A wife and a young family survive him. The funeral will be held in Brantford.

Those Hamilton Cases. The Indian liquor selling cases, which were launched at Hamilton by Brantford authorities may be the subject of an appeal. At Hamilton yesterday, Judge Snider heard a most unusual application when T. Sloan and Ross and Sloan brought an appeal in a criminal case to the Division Court. He submitted that there was authority for appeal being taken from the judgment of Magistrate Jellis in the recent cases in which J. O. Carpenter, James Bremner, and George Grey, liquor store proprietors and Henry Goldberg, hotelman, were charged with selling liquor to Indians, the case being thrown out. The ten days' grace allowed for appeal had expired, and Judge Snider demanded to know the authority under which permission to appeal was asked.
