plantations were emptied, and only women and boys remained to direct the work of the slaves which was to istain the Government and feed the armies. Trade died for lack of markets. Business offices were emptied. the flower of the population were drawn into the armies, resources were sapped and could not be renew ed. All this time the North increased in wealth and population. In the South there was presently nothing to tax, and the Confederate Government was at its wits end where to get money. Specie was scarce, and was hoarded until it almost passed out of circulation. Paper money took its place, and was soon so depreciated There were abundant harvests, but

that postal clerks at Richmond could not live on a salary of \$9,000 a year. no way of marketing them, as the railroads were needed by the troops. Commodities for domestic use reached unheard of prices, if available at all. There were no tea and coffee, and substitutes, such as grain, nuts and sassafras, being used. Homespun was revived for clothing, people went ragged and children without shoes as long as weather allowed. There was no salt, and the floors of old "smokelouses" were scraped for the drip-pings of past hams. There was not iron enough, and brass preserving kettles and bells were melted down o make cannon and arms. The end came with every sign of sheer ex-haustion and despair.

Toti-Italy's One-Legged Hero.

The war has furnished many extraordinary instances of daring deeds performed by men while suffering under severe physical disadvantages, but the most startling yet recorded is that of Enrico Toti, an Italian patriot, who, though minus a leg, managed to join the Italian forces in the Carso, where he died fighting for his ountry. But Toti was a remarkable character, and that his life and deeds have stirred the people throughout Italy is evidenced from the fact that a statue is being erected in Rome to his honor. In the Wide World Maga-zine appears a well-illustrated article dealing with this hero's life and death written by L. R. Freeman who. with the sanction of the authorities, made a special journey to the Carso Front to learn from comrades how Italy's one-legged soldier fought and died.
