A THROUGH LINE.

An important piece of news published in today's issue of the Nugget is that relating to the construction of a telegraph line from Atlin to Quesnelle and from Atlin to Bennett. When this is. carried into effect Dawson will have direct communication with the outside world without being subject to the annovance of having messages delayed at Skagway waiting transmission by boat to the lower country. Ouesnelle is located on a branch of the C. P. R., and is the most northerly point reached by telegraph in British Columbia. When the line has

been constructed connecting that point, the present northerly terminus of 'telegraphic communication, with Atlin, it will require only a comparatively small expenditure of money to connect the Dawson-Bennett line and through communication will then have become an established fact.

Mr. Charleson who so successfully and expeditiously completed the construction of the present line has been placed in complete charge of the construction of the new line as well as the construction of the new public build ings which Dawson will have next summer.

Mr. Charleson's connection with these important government undertak ings is quite a sufficient guarantee that they will be pushed to a completion as rapidly as circumstances will permit.
