Looking ahead to the distant day when Canada's soldiers will be called home, officers and men in the expeditionary force are being asked to answer' questions relating to a scheme for agricultural settlement: "Do you desire to take advantage of a scheme to assist in settlement after the war? Which province do you prefer to settle in? Would you work at prevailing wages on a farm to gain experience, provided your dependents were meanwhile given the same support as they now receive?" The men are specially advised by headquarters to carefully consider these questions and he prepared for a final answer at an early date.

The government's conscription policy is favored by the independent Ottawa Citizen provided certain essentials are included:

"Not only must the government be purified, but the nation must be made worthy the sacrifice of those who offer up their lives in its defence. The wealth of the nation must be called upon likewise and to the same extent as manhood. Production must be regulated and administered for war and not for profit, the rights of abor must be protected. Unless national service in the best interpretation of the word be instituted, conscription of manhood will become a mechanical function lacking everything which would tend it the expression of the national soul."

firit, oyster shell, charcoal, and dry mash are kept in hoppers constantly before the flock. Fresh water and, when possible, a dish of sour milk is also supplied. In the morning a light feed, and in the evening a full feed of mixed grain is given in the litter; at noon, green feed, and if desired, a feed of moist mash. When sour milk is not available, green cut bone may be fed alternately with the moist mash, or coarse beef scrap may be supplied in the hoppers.

The mash mixture is equal parts corn, bran, and middlings, half part glutten and half part blood flour or beef scrap. For old hens, either bran is used in place of the regular mash, or the hop-per is kept closed except at certain times of the day.
