KILLED HIS WIFE.

New Yorker Charged with Throw-
ing Her From Three-story
Window.

She had gone to a Wake, Stayed Out
Late, and the Tragedy Followed.

New York, Sept. 20. — A peculiarly
shocking tragedy occurred here early
yesterday morning, when Joseph Mc-
Guigan, according to the story of his
own daughter, threw himself upon his
wife, dragged her to the window and
hurled her out upon the stone pave-
ment three stories below. The
fortunate woman met instant death.
The McGuigans lived in a flat on
Second avenue, together with their
children, Mary McGuigan and Mrs.
Gormley. One of Mrs. McGuigan's
friends had recently died, and the
wake was held last night. She wished
to attend it, but McGuigan objected.
The woman insisted, and as she went
out her husband enjoined her to re-
turn early.

It was 2 o'clock in the morning when
she returned. A terrible scene follow-
ed her entry, culminating, according
to Mrs. Gormley, in the husband's at-
tack. The woman resisted fiercely,
the girl says, but in vain. McGuigan
pushed her to the window and thrust
her out. She grasped at the sill, and
managed to make good her hold, and
then, according to Mary McGuigan,
the man deliberately forced her hands
open and threw her down.

Her neck was broken. McGuigan
was arrested. Mrs. Gormley declares
that her mother jumped out of the
window of her own accord.

DRUGS NOT PURE.

Startling Disclosures of Adultera-
tion Made at the Big Con-
vention at Chicago.

Chicago, Sept. 20. — At the big con-
vention of wholesale and retail druggists here yesterday and today, it was
made a report which caused some-
thing of a stir. Instances of adultera-
tion were given as follows: Some
olive oil, branded with imported
labels, is cottonseed oil extracted
in eastern cities. Lethal coal
dust is palmed off as powdered anti-
mony. Soda is substituted in borax,
essential oils in perfume. It is al-
most unknown to the market, and
practically cannot be obtained. It
was the unanimous sentiment that
proper labels, as well as purity, should
be insisted upon and that the Bureau
pure food and drug bill introduced in-
to congress last session should be pass-
ed.

AFTER HOLLAND.

British Papers Want Explanations
of Aid Tendered Mr. Kruger.

New York, Sept. 20. — The Stand-
ard, commenting on the statement
that President Kruger has accepted an
offer of the Dutch government to con-
vey him to Europe in a war ship, says
the Tribune's London correspondent,
says Britain has a right to expect
that a country which is still diplo-
matically friendly shall not display
officious and effusive patronage of an
enemy of Britain. By adopting that
line makes itself his partisan and ren-
ders itself liable to be called upon
for explanations.

THESE CRUISERS

Will Equal Battleships in Their
Fighting Capabilities.

Will be Specially Equipped to Break
the Force of Torpedo Attacks—
Other Novelties.

London, Sept. 21.—Important depar-
tures in the construction of warships
are contemplated in the plans which
the British admiralty has adopted for
the improved type of second-class
cruisers. These novelties are said to
amount to a veritable revolution in
cruiser architecture, which, carried to
its logical conclusion, will make men-
of-war designed to prey on commerce
equal in fighting strength to battle-
ships both as regards size and speed.
The armour equipment of the new
vessels will rival cruisers of the first-
class. Their most radical characteris-
tics will be their armor-protected
decks and heavily armoured conning
towers. In addition it is proposed to
supply them with a special equipment
to work in the event of torpedo at-
tacks. Commenting on the Admiralty's
plans James Dunn, naval director of
the firm of Vickers, Sons & Maxim,
limited, said to a Chicago Record cor-
respondent:—

"We have no access to the govern-
ment's patterns, but we presume that
innovations will be introduced into
King Alfred, Good Hope, and Levi-
athan, the three new cruisers now build-
ing. In addition, the new cruisers now
building have an increasing respect for
the naval progress of the United
States."

The ideas of American shipbuild-
ers," said he, "have shown a marked
improvement within the last two
years. The United States are certainly
constructing a splendid fleet. We
still, it is true, withhold our approval
of your latest type of battleship be-
cause we are of the opinion that a
double turret makes a man-of-war
unnecessarily vulnerable. It seems
unnecessary to afford the enemy an op-
portunity of wrecking a battery of
four guns, when a shot striking a
single turret would put both guns
out of action."

HIS LAST LETTER

Athlete Will Clare Wrote in
Storm-wrecked Galveston,
Facing Death.

Cast up by the Waves in a Foot Ball,
It Has Reached Its Address in
New York.

New York, Sept. 21.—Mrs. Frank
Magee, of 83 East Ninety-ninth street,
has received a letter from Will Clare,
presumably one of the victims of the
Galveston flood, as nothing has been
heard of him since. The letter was
written in the face of death and with
others enclosed in a football and set
afloat. There is nothing to indicate
how the message was found but it is
supposed the football was cast up by
the waves after the storm was over.
The letter reads:

Dear Boss: I think I am done for.
Big storm it's out in the ocean in a
stone house, water up second story.
I am going to get out of this hotel
and take chances on catching log.
Bodies floating every place. Every
man allowed two letters. Write me
in football. If I escape will
write. Love to all. I sent other
letter to Jean. Good-by. It's awful.

Will Clare was a former pitcher for
the New York baseball team, and an
all-around athlete. He was 30 years old
and married. At the time of the
storm he had been in Galveston two
weeks as the representative of the
Armour Packing Co. of Kansas City.
He narrowly escaped the Johnston
flood, having gone out of town to play
a game of baseball. The letter was han-
dled across two pages of a rail-
road folder.

NO HOPE TO WIN.

The Liberal Whip Tells English
Liberals They Cannot Win.

Annexation of the Boer Republics
Absolutely Accepted.

New York, Sept. 21.—A London spe-
cial to the Evening Post says:—"Spe-
cial emphasis should be laid upon Her-
bert Gladstone's speech at Leeds last
night, as an indication of the lines
upon which official Liberalism enters
the political campaign now beginning.
Gladstone is the chief Liberal whip,
and speaks with a knowledge of official
Liberal opinions. He said the
Liberal Leaders, including Campbell-
Bannerman, Asquith, Sir Edward
Grey, Sir Henry Fowler, and John
Morley absolutely accepted annex-
ation of the Boer Republics as inevit-
able and permanent. He did not men-
tion Harcourt by name. The Libera-
ls were, he said, prepared to tackle
the army, temperance, and other home
reforms. Home Rule, was, for the
present, outside the range of practical
politics. His advice was to let it sleep
a while. He added that the election
could not put the Liberals into power.
It was idle to suppose that the could
win 160 seats, without which no re-
sponsible Liberal would think of tak-
ing office, but Liberalism would do
much better at the polls than many of
their friends dared to hope."
