GREAT BRITAIN'S INCREASED TAXATION.

To the Editor of The Planet: Dear Sir,—The Chancellor of the Exchequer imposes a tax of three pence a hundred weight on grain and five pence a hundred weight on flour.

They almost invariably start from the assumption that people who are not liable to income tax escape toward the payment of their fair share toward the national revenue.

It may be said that the poorer classes do not consume so much of some of the dutiable commodities as the wealthier classes.

As to direct taxation, the average amount paid by each taxpayer contributing to it is estimated by Mr. Morgan-Brown at \$23-10 per annum.

By means of duties on such necessities the poorer classes are already overtaxed. If their means are considered in comparison with the rest of the community.

The increase of the cost of the necessities of life through additional taxation will therefore be a hardship on the whole body politic by the inevitable lowering of the standard of health and comfort of a large part of the population.
