

Hamilton, Nov. 4.-The case of Hamilton, Nov. 4.—The case of T. Hillhouse Brown, manager of the King street east branch of the Bank of Hamilton, who was arrested Thursday afternoon for embezzlement, was called at the Police Court yesterday morning. He was not brought up from the jail, however. T. H. Cerear represented his interests. Crown Attorney Washington interests. Crown Attorney Washington was present on behalf of the Crown and William Lees for the bank. A remand was granted till next Thursday, though Mr. Crerar wanted it for the usual eight days. It is understood that J. W. Nesbitt, K. C., will act for Mr. Brown when he comes up for a preliminary hearing. They consulted with him in jall yesterday morning.

The Formal Charges.

There are three charges against Brown; falsifying the bank book for \$5,100, stealing \$853, forging the inspector's initials on an account as though it had been passed by the in-

though it had been passed by the inspector.

The defaleation was said yesterday to amount to about \$130,000. The bank is understood to be secured for \$50,000. The accused is said to have defrauded the bank out of this large sum by working it between the general ledger and the savings bank ledger, changing, from one account to the other, and fixing it so that the inspector could not detect the wrong without a very searching examination of the books, which is never done unless suspicion rests on a bank man.

The prisoner has turned over his life insurance policies amounting to \$47,000, and some real estate in which has presented. he speculated with the bank's money. With the bonds under which the exmanager worked, the insurance and other securities it is estimated that about \$50,000 of the shortage will be covered.
