The Canadian Olympic hockey team arrived safely in England last Friday. Nicolai, Lenine, premier of Soviet Russia, died on Monday afternoon.

A fire in the business section of North Sydney early Tuesday morning destroyed \$175,000 worth of property.

Captain Michael Ryan, bandmaster of the R. C. R., so long stationed at Halifax, died at Montreal on Tuesday night.

C. E. Wigmore, of the Kentville hockey team, has been suspended by the M. P. B. A. U. of C. on account of professional charges.

Sir Robert Borden has been appointed Chancellor of Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., in succession to E. W. Beatty, K. C., president of the C. P. C., who resigned last spring.

The preacher at the Baptist Church on Sunday morning was Rev. G. D. Jackson, pastor of the Canard Baptist Church, who delivered two effective sermons which were greatly enjoyed by the congregation.

MARRIED MEN HAVE LONGER SPAN OF LIFE

There are some hard jolts, for bachelors in Sir Arthur Holmes' latest edition of "Elements of Vital Statistics" because, he says, not only does a married man live longer than a bachelor, but he can regard himself on an average as the best bet for the male community.

While bachelors may contend that a married man thinks he has a longer lease on life because it seems longer than if he were single, Sir Arthur says it is a fact that married men do have a longer span of life. Some of the reasons he advances are: "The superiority of married men at all ages may variously be interpreted. As a rule a married man is in a more secure social position than the unmarried man and correspondingly has a better economic and sanitary environment. Probably still more influential is the fact that married men are selected, the less fit or actually unhealthy being less likely to marry than healthy men."

Sir Arthur says that widows in the aggregate have a much higher death rate at all ages than either single or married women. The corresponding figures for widowers are unobtainable, as adds "It is probable that all that is connoted by the term 'social misery' is more instrumental in causing an excessive death rate among widows than among widowers."
