ST. STEPHEN FAIR OFFERS 3 STAKES

Entrance Fee Cut to 3 Per Cent. and Non-Winners Starting Will Get Refund.

Three stakes are on the St. Stephen Fair racing programme for September 14 to 17, being 2.20 and 2.30 mixed events and a 2.24 straight trot.

The value of each stake is \$400 and the entrance fee is only 3 per cent. with 7 per cent. deducted from winners while to non-winners that start entrance money will be refunded.

In mixed classes four seconds will be allowed trotters and two horses can be named from a stable and start if full entrance is paid on each. All races will be mile heats and in the programme of class races to be announced later Secretary P. D. J. Graham says there will be included a free for all and a race for three year olds and under. Entries close on June 1st.

CROWN PRINCE, 2.25.

His Sale at \$20,000 and Half of His Winnings Equipped That of Bill Sharon, 2.16 1/2.

Writing in the Halifax Recorder, James W. Powers, the well known Halifax racing authority, has the following:

"The despatch from Fredericton stating that Bill Sharon, 2.16 1/2, had been sold for \$3,500, the largest amount ever paid for a trotter ever foaled in the Maritime Provinces, recalls old-timers that two score years ago there was a horse sold for a much larger sum. This was the grey gelding Crown Prince, which raced in the Maritime Provinces in the early seventies, and was sold to parties in the United States for double figures in the thousands."

"R. H. Edwards, who was contemporary with racing in the Provinces in those days, says that his recollection is that Crown Prince was sold for \$20,000 and half his winnings on the Grand Circuit, which that year amounted to \$3,200. Crown Prince was bred in Maine, but he was foaled in New Brunswick in 1862."

"He was sired by Logan's Messenger, by State of Maine, by Tuf-ton's Sampson, by Winthrop Messenger, by imported Messenger, dam Lady Messenger, by Warrior, son of Young Messenger, by Winthrop Messenger. He made his record of 2.25 at New York, Sept. 18, 1873, which was very fast for those days, when only high wheeled sulkeys were used. The world's trotting record in 1873 was 2.15 1/2, held jointly by Goldsmith Maid and Occident."

"The well known New Brunswick stallion, Sir Charles, sire of several speedy New Brunswick fast ones, was out of the dam of Crown Prince."

"There are two men in St. John who can give some interesting information about Crown Prince—C. W. Bell, who drove him in his races, and D. C. Clinch, the veteran turf authority."

CANADIAN HOCKEY TEAM AT ANTWERP

The Canadian Team Favorites in Betting for Honors at Olympic Series.

(Associated Press by Leased Wire.) Antwerp, April 20.—The Canadian hockey team, which arrived last week by way of England, has been practicing daily in preparation for the opening game of the Olympic series, which will take place on Friday night. Practices have been held at the Antwerp Ice Palace, where the contests are to take place. The players declare the ice in excellent shape.

The Canadians were on hand yesterday to welcome the members of the United States team, who arrived in the afternoon, none the worse for a few days of rather rough weather. All of the teams entered for competition are now here, with the exception of the French team, who are only a few hours away, and are training steadily in Paris.

After fraternizing with the American players during the afternoon the Canadians turned out in the evening to watch the first practice of the boys from the south of the line. They expressed the opinion that the "Yankees" are likely to be strong contenders for the hockey title.

The drawing for the first pairings will be held Thursday afternoon. The Canadians are hoping to meet the Americans early in the series. The players from the Dominion have been given a great reception by the British Army contingent stationed here and will have a strong roster "choir" to give them encouragement during the games. The American army officers stationed at the Antwerp base will root for the United States team.

Both Canadian and American teams have made arrangements for daily practices until the opening games. The Canadians are favorites in the betting here.

Page to Organize A Baseball League

Some time ago The Gleaner said the formation of a professional baseball league in the Maritime Provinces was in contemplation. The St. John Standard today says that Toe Page, of Montreal, is taking the matter up and says:

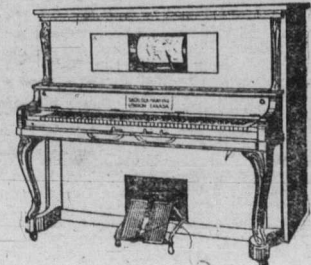
