To the Editors of the Advocate.

In the Advocate of the 2nd Inst., I noticed a communication under the signature of J. T., who desires to be informed why the Fishermen in Over-seer Parker's district have been allowed to fish sixteen days later than those on the West River. Now, in justice to his curiosity, I will briefly state the reason. An application was sent from my district to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, requesting an extension of time to fish from Beaupre Island up, on the South West, to first September, which request was granted, and the request authority sent to me for the chief of Department to allow the fishermen to take Salmon up to the time specified, which authority I consider sufficient for me. If I had pursued the same course on the North West River they would, I have no doubt, been granted the same privilege.

But further he says perhaps over-seer Parker has been invested with discretionary powers, and insinuates that I gave the extension on my own responsibility. If Mr. J. T. had read the law carefully and understood it properly he would learn that all Fishery Overseers appointed under the Dominion Government are clothed with discretionary powers in many cases, but not sufficient in my opinion to justify them in giving an extension of time beyond the legal period.

In conclusion I challenge the writer of that article, whoever he may be, to point out a single instance when I, or ever since my appointment to office, usurped an authority that did not belong to me, or that I have been favoring any individual in the district over which I have supervision.
