Mr. Wilson 1897 the total amount spent on immigration has been \$5.822.532. Mr. Wilson thought entirely too much encouragement was given to many undesirable clases of immigrants, and not enough descring the immigrants. ENTOMBED IN MINE.

MINERS CAUGHT AT MOUNT CAR MEL BY DAM BREAKING.

Heavy Rains Caused Great Body o Water to Collect and Finally to Break Through the Breast Into

Pottsvile, Pa., Feb. 17 .- Twenty-eight miners were imprisoned in the Midvale Colliery, near Mount Carmal, to-day by the breaking of a dam of water which had formed in a drift which caused a had formed in a drift which caused a rush of mud into the gangway where the men were at work. All day long a party of rescuers endeavored to reach the entombed men, and about 6 j. m. they were given encouragement by the sound of digging from the inside. Later a shot was also heard, indicating that the men were at work to effect their own rescue, and also giving assurance that the air is good.

Among the men entombed are a number of experienced miners, and it is her

Among the men entombed are a num-ber of experienced miners, and it is be-lieved that it will be possible to effect the rescue of all the men unless some of them should have met death by being smothered in the rush of mud when the

smothered in the rush of mud when the dam broke through the gangway.

The men had been employed in No. 4 drift of the east side gangway, driving a heading to the surface. The heavy rains and thaw of the last few days had caused a great dam of water to collect in No. 2 breast of No. 4 drift, and the pressure became so heavy that it finally broke through and a great sea of mud flowed into the gangway, where the men were at work. It filled it for a distance of about 350 feet, and it will be necessary to dig through the barrier of mud to get at the workmen from this direction.

Three different rescuing parties have Three different rescuing parties have been put to work in an endeavor to release the entombed men. One force is digging away the great bank of mud which fills the gangway, another gang is engaged in driving a heading from an adjoining gangway, while a third force has been put to work at the point where the entombed men were to have driven the heading to the surface from the gangway in which they are now imprisoned. It is believed that the last named gang will be the first to reach the entombed men, and it is hoped to be able to get them out or give them food and drink by to-morrow morning.

Great crowds of people have gathered around the mouth of the slope and have announced their intention of remaining all night. They include the families of the entombed men.
