PRICE OF FLOUR
HAS TAKEN DROP
The wholesale price of a barrel of flour by the car load has decreased forty cents. In other words, instead of paying \$13.65 per barrel, the baker will pay only \$13.25. This recession became effective yesterday and will, no doubt, be received gladly by house-holders who hope that further reductions will lead to the obtaining of cheaper bread. As a matter of fact, flour is virtually cheaper than the above quotation, as the difference in prices between woolen and jute packages is greater than ever and while a barrel of flour today can be purchased by the car load for \$13.25 per barrel of 195 pounds, two bags containing a similar weight may be obtained today for \$12.10. It is considered that the drop on Saturday in the Chicago wheat market was reflected in Canada, and that yesterday's reduction is a consequence.
