BRITISH FORESTRY MEMBERS ENJOY SAIL ON RIVER

The members of the British Forestry Association, came through from Bathurst Tuesday morning to Depot Camp and were there the guests of the J. B. Snowball Co. at a woods dinner which was served in style by expert chefs, after which in a neat speech Mr. W. B. Snowball proposed the health of the Association and Lord Lovat responded for the members.

After inspecting the woods nearby the party was conveyed by auto to Newcastle and then to Chatham via the Morrissy bridge. They were guests at lawn tea at the residence of J. W. Brankley and were welcomed to Chatham by Mayor Hickey. In the evening the party had a sail on the river, going on board the S.S. Alexandra and running down river. At Loggieville the band was taken on board and its playing greatly enlivened the evening's proceedings.

The return to Chatham was made at 10 o'clock and the distinguished party entrained at the Chatham station where their special train had been placed on siding after it came through from Bathurst. The train left at 11 o'clock for St. John.

HARVESTERS NEEDED IN WESTERN CANADA

Excursions by Canadian National Railways Will Be On August 3rd and 17th by Special Trains

To harvest the bumper crop of golden grain in the west 50,000 able bodied men are badly needed.

The call from the west is for help and more help. The wheat and it must be successfully harvested and stored for transport.

Low fares will prevail from all points in the Maritime Provinces to Winnipeg, and all points further west. The going dates for these special fares are on August 3rd and 17th when special trains will leave Newcastle at 6:30 p.m. The fare from Newcastle to Winnipeg will be \$22.00 plus half a cent per mile to points beyond in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, Edmonton, Calgary, McLeod and east. Special fares apply also for the return trip.

The harvest trains this year will be of very fine equipment. There will be convertible berth colonist cars of latest design and special car service for women and children so that all may travel in comfort. A specially constructed Lunch Counter Car will provide the best facilities for food and refreshments at very reasonable prices. Trains will be especially conducted and every precaution taken to ensure safe and quick transport to the west.

Via the Canadian National is the shortest and best route to the west. Intending excursionists should enquire quickly as to rates, conditions of travel, etc. All ticket agents of the Canadian National Railways will give the required information.

SCHOONER ON NELSON BEACH FOR REPAIRS

The Russian Schooner Sinams, which sprung a leak on her voyage over here was towed to Burchill's Boom, Nelson, on Monday by the tug "J. W. Brankley". She will be beached there and a crew of ship carpenters put to work at it.

At first the captain intended docking his ship at the Snowball Co's dock, but later decided upon the alternative course.

Here and There

The total elevator capacity of Port Arthur and Port William will reach 65,000,000 bushels by September of this year. By the end of 1924 the elevator capacity is expected to reach seventy millions.

Immigration returns of the Canadian Government for the first five months of the present year show a one hundred per cent increase in immigration from the British Isles over the figures for the same period of last year.

The 1923 apple crop of the Okanagan Valley will amount to 4,620 cars according to the estimate of W. T. Hunter, district horticulturist. This is an increase of 20 per cent over last year and a record for the district. The apple crop for Kootenay and boundary districts will approximate 380,000 boxes.

A new high record of production was established by Canadian newsprint mills during May with 110,252 tons, an increase of nearly 10,000 tons over the month of April and 15,750 over May of last year. The daily production in May was 4,084 tons, the highest in the history of the Canadian industry.

Following the opening of the Banff-Windermere Motor Highway, Lieutenant Governor Nichol of British Columbia and Randolph Bruce were honored by the Kootenay Indians who made them an honorary chief and full chieftain of their tribe respectively. The Indian celebrations were held at Windermere in the beautiful Windermere Valley.

Several new air stations are to be opened in Ontario and Quebec in the near future for the purpose of extending the forest area to be patrolled by airplanes. A base is to be established at Ramsay Lake near Sudbury, and from this point all Ontario work will radiate; operations being carried on at Orient Bay, Remi Lake and at least two other substations not yet announced.

If the Canadian pre-war exports of flour are considered as 100, the Dominion's average export total between 1921 and 1923 can be considered as 207. Comparatively, pre-war exports of the United States being rated at 100, its present export is at the rate of 147. This indicates that Canada has more than doubled her export trade in flour while the United States has increased its trade by 47 per cent. Before the war Canada exported 3,522,000 barrels, while at present her exports average 7,885,000 barrels a year.—"Journal of Commerce."

Mr. Georges Delrue, one of the most important personages of France arrived in Montreal by the S.S. "Minnedosa" to take up residence at St. Johns, Que. Georges is two and a half years old and has spent most of his life with his grand parents in Tourcoing, a smart town on the border line of Belgium and France. The journey from the old homestead, via Antwerp, Georges made alone but never out of sight of the watchful eyes of the officials and servants of the company.

Major General Lord Lovett, a passenger on the Canadian Pacific liner "Montcalm," and delegate to the British Empire Forestry Conference, Ottawa, said in connection with his investigations into Canadian forestry methods and applied science, "England has but a small forest area in comparison to Canada, nevertheless, her forests were depleted two-thirds to meet the emergencies of the War, and now we are determined to recover this loss by practical reforestation. We have been working at this for the last three years and expect to make a complete recovery of our work in any other year."
