The Imperial Government, by granting a subsidy of £45,000 annually, show that they heartily endorse the proposition of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company to establish a new mail, passenger and freight route between Liverpool and Sydney, New South Wales.

From national and sentimental standpoints the establishment of the line should be favored by Britons the world over. By its means there will be a direct communication between the Mother Country and her principal dependencies—India, Australia and Canada—forming a complete circle round the globe and uniting the two antipodes.
