MONTEAL ITALIAN STABBED A WOMAN

Crime on Leading Residential Street—Murderer Captured After Hard Chase.

Montreal, Dec. 23.—In full view of a dozen pedestrians on University, one of the leading residential streets of the city, an Italian plunged a dagger three times into the side of a young woman with whom he was walking late this afternoon, and then took to his heels followed by a number of pursuers.

Winnipeg, Dec. 27.—A warrant has been sworn out for Park A. Smith, of Nugent, Smith & Co., commission merchant, it appears that a car of provisions was consigned to a contractor at Dryden, Smith secured the bills of lading and altered the destination to Port Arthur, Smith went to Port Arthur and sold the car before it arrived to J. G. King & Company for \$2,000 and \$4,000.

Electric Power at \$24.65.

Winnipeg, Dec. 25.—The Electric Railway Board has already made a report to the city which they propose to supply manufacturers and others with power at their own transmission lines for \$24.65 per horse power, this being the same price as City Engineer Rutten estimated for the city, the city could supply consumers under its own power scheme. The principal concession is that whereas the company a month or two ago was offering to supply power to manufacturers at a price of 10c per kilowatt hour, the condition then imposed was that the city was to take 10% outside the city limits and to distribute.

Mason Shot and Killed Father.

Winnipeg, Dec. 27.—Martin McNamee, capitalist, was shot and killed last night by his son Edwin. It is said the trouble occurred over a division of property, the father intending to marry and feed a large part to the son, intended wife, Edwin shot his father three times, two balls passing through the victim's head. Edwin then tried to shoot his own life by taking chloroform, but did not succeed. He is now in the custody of Sheriff Lee, of North-west, and is being carefully guarded. The crime occurred on the father's farm.

Dean Farthing Scores Kingstonsians.

Kingston, Dec. 27.—Dean Farthing's farewell sermon in St. George's cathedral on the eve of his departure to become bishop of Montreal, was a vigorous arraignment of the Kingston people.
