

Another Interesting Debate Saturday.

Saturday afternoon the pupils of St. Bonaventure's College had another interesting debate. The subject discussed was, "Which is the greater affliction, blindness or deafness?" Masters H. Leseman, T. Tracey, W. French, L. O'Brien and A. Ellis held that blindness was the greater affliction, while Masters J. Edens, J. Gear, F. Devereaux, J. Emerson and F. Parsons took the other to be the greater malady. Sound arguments were advanced by both sides and good speeches were made. The verdict of the jury was in favor of blindness. Rev. Bro. Culhane presided. Another debate will be held next Saturday.

Mayor Ellis Very Ill.

While attending last Mass at the R. C. Cathedral yesterday, Mayor Ellis was taken suddenly ill. Dr. Shea, who was kneeling in one of the seats a short distance behind him, came to his aid and assisted him into the Sacristy, where the Mayor collapsed. Engineer Ryan, J. J. Bates, Geo. J. Coughlan and P. J. Hanley went to his assistance and did all that they possibly could. Nurse Hannaford, who happened to be in the church, was also called to his assistance. After ministering to him the Mayor rallied somewhat and in the meantime Councillor Martin had procured a sleigh, and drove him home. He is somewhat improved this morning.

Fourteen Arrests Made

The police Saturday night put 14 prisoners in the cells, 12 of whom were disorderlies, while two were women who deserted from the Gaudalborce. Four of these men were released yesterday on making the usual deposit, and the rest were held to appear to-day. Saturday night Water Street West was in a state of uproar for sometime but the police put the brawlers to route.

The Home Here.

The S. S. Home arrived here from Bushoon via Placentia and Trepassay at 4 p.m. yesterday, and butted her way from Duder's up to the R. N. Co. Dock. The ship left Placentia last Tuesday but owing to the stormy weather had to put back. She left again on Friday but had to harbor at Trepassay owing to meeting heavy slob ice; she left again next morning and had a good run down to St. John's. She was docked for repairs this morning. The ship was completely under water about at Bushoon, and her cabin furniture is very much damaged. It will take several weeks to put the ship in good condition.

Typhus Patient Dead.

Another death from typhus fever occurred at the hospital yesterday, the victim being Alexander Street, being the victim. He went to the institution on the 18th inst., and he will be buried to-day.

No new cases have developed at Witless Bay since the man Armstrong died of the disease, and the house he occupied has been released from quarantine.

Rescued the S.S. Euphrates.

The S. S. Adventure which left here Saturday forenoon to go to the assistance of the Euphrates, returned here at 6 p.m. that day. The Euphrates was in the ice off Horse Cove, near Pauline for several days, and the big ice breaker was not long in forcing her way through the floe and towing her out of danger, taking her to Bell Island where she also landed several passengers who went forward in her.

Temperance Sunday.

Rev. Canon White, assisted by Rev. Mr. Bell, presided yesterday at the celebration of Temperance Sunday in the Cathedral. There was a large attendance. The service began with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist on behalf of the work of the Society. Many members made their Corporal Communion. A special sermon was preached at Evensong. Rev. C. H. Bolt and Rev. Canon White read the lessons, and Revs. J. Bell and C. H. Barton recited the office. Rev. Canon White preached an excellent sermon from I. Cor. 9: 25—"Every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things." The preacher referred to the evil effects of intemperance and the fact that people did not all see eye to eye. As to the remedy, however, there was no doubt as to the existence of the evil and the baneful effects thereof and any remedial measures should have the support of the whole church. Even on the grounds of material prosperity, especially in this age, the temperate man has an argument that is strong in favor of abstinence from spirits. This is the age of keen competition; the cost of living is becoming higher every year, so that if a man wishes to get on he must be sober. The drinking man is being crowded out every day, and the man who wishes to succeed must be temperate in all things. In spiritual matters, too, if a man wishes to advance, he can only gain the mastery over his passions by being temperate. The season of Lent, now at hand, was instituted in order to provide a means to enable man to gain self control over his passions and appetites. He expressed the hope that all the congregation would strive by the grace of God to gain the mastery over all that was base and evil and to win the crown of joy at last. Appropriate hymns were rendered. Benediction brought the service to a close.
